# LITTLE CHANGE IN LOCAL

MARKETS-WHEAT STEADY

and the Benefit is Being Reaped by the Farmers-Shipping Trust Has Gone to Pieces.

There has been but slight change in the local markets for the past week. Water and Muskmelons are off the market entirely. Cabbage has dropped from three to two cents a pound and the same decline has been made in onlons. Eggs are 25 cents a dozen instead of 20 as quoted a week ago and this takes the ranch egg domestic use. Now is the time that beef and pork is cheaper on the table than eggs. A slight change is no-tice in sait. Instead of coarse sait being quoted today at \$1 a hundred it has advanced 25 cents. All other products are strong on the market, but prices are unchanged.

# Wheat.

The local wheat market remains at the same figure that it was a week ago. This cereal is quoted at 52 cents, but local markets are dull. Little is being offered. Those having their grain yet are confident of an other raise soon and are holding on an uncertain market. According to good authority the local price being quoted is better than it was last year to compare the Liverpool prices. The Cregonian says that one year ago wheat was selling in Portland at 53 and 54 cents a bushel and today it is quoted at  $62\frac{1}{2}$  cents a bushel. This is claimed to be 10 and 11 cents more, to compare the prices in Liverpool. than was paid last year at this time. Caused by Tramp Steamers.

This is said to be caused by the low freight rate which is hauling wheat to tidewater cheaper than ever before and the operation of tramp steamers plying between Sound points and the world markets. They

Prices are very firm, but have not changed much. Territory wools have not been bringing full prices, and holders are firm and confident.
