# MYSTERY SOLVED

CHARLES STERLING HAS BEEN LOCATED.

Left His Home on Account of Domestic Troubles—An Old, Old Story.

Light is being thrown on the mysterious disappearance of Charles Sterling, of Milton, whose friends expressed the belief that he had become lost in the mountains or had been foully dealt with by robbers, some two weeks ago. Searching parties have scoured the mountains around Weston in quest of his dead body. Pitiful tales, told of the wife and young babe left alone by the grim hand of death, have been circulated and believed. Now comes the sequel, and death has nothing to do with it.

The young man has been traced to Baker City, where he stabled his horse, upon which he had left Milton on a pretended search for a lost cow, and registered at a hotel as George Sterling. His movements since his arrival in Baker City are not known, nor are they of particular interest now that it has been learned that his dead body does not lie exposed to the storms of the mountains.

The motive of his abrupt and mysterious disappearance from Milton, however, is of interest, for it furnishes the key to the whole situation. Early information regarding his disappearance tended to show that there was no reason for the voluntary desertion of his wife and child, but investigation of the facts proves differently. It is now apparent to those in a position to know that young Sterling had domestic troubles of a delicate nature, which drove him to leave home and seek new scenes. Instead of searching for a lost cow, the new version of the story says he has gone in search of lost peace of mind.

The searching parties have been called in and sympathy in Milton is somewhat divided as to which one of the principals it should be lavished upon.

### BOYD IN HOSPITAL.

Charged With Taking Watch From An Outbuilding.

Mark Boyd and Austin Wells, brought to Pendleton yesterday on the charge of having a watch in their possession which did not belong to them, were released on their own recognizance by District Attorney Halley.

Both these young men are well known here and have many friends. They were in Helix last week, and upon going into an outhouse found a watch hanging on a nail where it had been left by its owner, Charles Aispach. The watch had Aispach's initials on the case, but it seems that Boyd put it in his pocket and did not attempt to return it to the owner. Later when the watch was missed, they were suspected and a warrant sworn out for them.

They were arrested in Athena, where Boyd was in a serious condition from the effects of an injury received by falling through a railroad trestle Saturday night. He was taken to the county hospital, where he will be kept until he becomes able to be taken into court and tried for having possession of the watch without the consent of the owner. Wells was released as he was thought not to be implicated in taking the watch.

### FREEWATER APPLES.

A Carload a Day to be Shipped Until November.

N. W. Mumford Wednesday bought of Mr. Ellis Ireland his crop of winter apples for the Walla Walla Produce company. The apples are the finest to be found in the county and will make 6000 or 7000 boxes. Mr. Mumford states that they will begin packing at once. He has also 10,000 boxes in the Mud Creek district, and is putting out 4 carloads per week, and have 14 men and six girls employed. They expect to ship 40 or 50 carloads, shipping one carload a day during the next few weeks, continuing until the first of November. —Freewater Times.

### EXAMINATION FOR CARRIERS.

Six Applications for Positions on Pendleton Free Mail Delivery.

There were six applicants in before 5 o'clock Monday evening to take examinations for civil service in Pendleton. The examinations will be made on the 15th of October at the courthouse. A special examiner will be here from Washington, D. C., to have charge of the examinations.

Five of the applicants are new ones, and one took the examination last spring when the move was on for free delivery. At the former examination all the class of a half dozen passed except one and it was he who has handed in his application the second time. Those to pass in a former examination were not allowed to compete the second time.

This civil service examination is preparatory to the establishing of a free mail delivery in the city. For more than a year the people of Pendleton have been promised free delivery and the time for starting it was set several times, but each time something would happen to put it off until a later date. Now it is an assured thing that beginning with the first of the year the free delivery will be put into working order. Two delivery clerks will be required to make the town and a substitute to take the place of the regular clerks in case of illness or unavoidable detention from work. It will be several weeks after the examinations, before it is known here who are the lucky ones appointed. The papers will be sent to Washington, D. C., and examined by a board of examiners and the three passing the best examination will be awarded the places.
