GENERAL NEWS.

At Edinburgh, Scotland, yesterday, the "Cap of Freedom of Perth" was presented to Andrew Carnegie in recognition of his benefactions in Scotland.

Governor A. T. Bliss, of Michigan, was thrown from his horse near Washington Circle during the G. A. R. parade, at Washington, and suffered severe bruises about the body.

The same pipes used for congealing ice cream for table use were connected with a small cold storage plant in which was found 30 dead bodies which had been put there by officials of medical colleges in Louisville, Ky.

In the Landsting at Copenhagen, Foreign Minister Deuntzer submitted a bill ratifying the cession of the Danish West Indies to the United States, and urged a speedy settlement of the matter. The first reading of the bill is fixed for October 15, the second reading will occur October 22.

The revolutionists of Venezuela will triumph, probably in a fortnight, and La Guayra and Caracas will capitulate. Every effort is being made to capture President Castro who, it is asserted, will be assassinated if caught. The president, it is claimed, will attempt to seek refuge on board a foreign man of war.

A decision has been handed down in the United States circuit court by Judge Lacombe, in which he holds that a citizen of Porto Rico is not a citizen of the United States, and as such entitled to land here without interference from the immigration laws, but is, the insular decision notwithstanding, an alien within the meaning of the law.

To revenge herself upon King Alexander of Serbia, for stopping her "pin money," Queen Draga created scandalous scenes before the courtiers. The king reproached the queen with being the cause of his life. Queen Draga retorted with coarse abuse, accusing the king of a liaison with her sister Helen, and even boxed the king's ears.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Hood River orchardists Wednesday began their fifth biennial fruit fair.

The Loewenberg-Going Company, of Salem, has paid its convict labor account for August, amounting to \$1,251.50.

Bill Barber, colored, was placed in jail at Moscow, Idaho, Thursday, on the charge of murdering Kendrick White at a negro picnic in Douglass, Coffey county, Georgia, in August, 1901.

The drug store, two dwellings, a blacksmith shop and three barns were totally destroyed by fire Wednesday at Prairie City. The loss is estimated at \$8000, partially insured. It is thought the fire was the work of an incendiary.

Mrs. Hobart shot S. Lee, a harvest hand, at Joel, six miles east of Moscow, Idaho, Thursday. Lee drove to the Hobart home, where he had trouble with the woman. While he was sitting in a wagon 150 feet from her, Mrs. Hobart fired twice, one bullet entering the back, just below the right shoulder.

After tramping 3000 miles and being on the road a year and one day, A. O. and J. H. McCormick reached Walla Walla from Denver. The men left Columbus, O., originally and walked to the Pan-American exposition. Then they returned to Denver and started west with five burros to carry their equipment, to see the sights.

Shipments of machinery are arriving daily at Vancouver for the construction of the Portland drydock. The force of workmen is being gradually increased, and in a few weeks a small army will be employed. A dock for the reception of material from the river boats has been erected, and the engine and boiler have already been placed in the machinery building.

NEW BREWERY BUILDING.

Jacob Betz Will Erect Five-Story Brick at Walla Walla.

Yesterday Jacob Betz began tearing down one of the old landmarks of Walla Walla, the old wooden building at Alder and Third streets, preparatory to erecting a modern brewery, five stories in height. The immense structure will be completed some time next spring and will be one of the largest buildings in Walla Walla.

The old wooden building which for so many years served as the main part of the Betz brewery, was at one time the courthouse of Walla Walla county. It was built about the year 1872 by Sam Lincoln, who conducted a lumber yard in that part of town. Later the county leased the building, and with a few alterations it served as the hall of justice. Twenty-one years ago Jacob Betz purchased the property, raised the ceiling and used it for his saloon.

In 1899 Mr. Betz erected a four-story building adjoining the wooden building and with the completion of the new structure he will have the largest brewing establishment in Southeastern Washington and Eastern Oregon. Mr. Betz said he would have erected his new brewery on property in Third street, below Birch, had it not been for the big brick which was put up in 1899.—Walla Walla Union.
