WHY BLUE MOUNTAIN RESERVE.

J. H. Gwinn, of This City, Tells the Baker City Herald. J. H. Gwinn, secretary of the Oregon Woolgrowers' association, and district manager for the New York Life Insurance company, accompanied by J. H. Blanford, district agent, returned Wednesday evening from a business trip into Pine and Eagle valleys. Mr. Gwinn, by virtue of his connection with the Oregon Woolgrowers' association, is a strenuous advocate and supporter of the proposed Eastern Oregon forest reserve in Grant county, about which so much has lately been said and written. He returned hurriedly from the Panhandle Wednesday in order to be present at the meeting of Baker City Chamber of Commerce, advance notice of which he read in the Herald while in the wilds of Pine valley. He arrived in time to be present at the meeting, but was sorely disappointed at the proceedings thereof. "I was surprised," said Mr. Gwinn yesterday to a Herald representative, "at the lack of interest in the proposed reserve displayed by your chamber. I listened attentively to the expression of opinions by members at the meeting, expecting to hear something new either for or against the proposed reserve. In this I was not disappointed, because one member of the chamber in a speech antagonistic to a withdrawal of the Strawberry mountain region, announced that as a result of extended observation he had become convinced of the fallacy of the theory that the cutting of timber near the headwaters of mountain streams caused a decrease in water supply. This statement, so diametrically opposed as it is to the observation of eminent government engineers was rather a startling argument against the proposed reserve. "I am well aware," continued Mr. Gwinn, "that there is in some parts of Eastern Oregon a well-defined feeling in opposition to the creation of the Blue mountain forest reserve. This opposition, however, I believe comes from persons who are not familiar with the facts. I am led to believe this, because of the many arguments that have been advanced against it. As I understand it, a certain area of land has been withdrawn from settlement in the Strawberry mountain region, pending the final and definite creation of a forest reserve within final and definite limits. I believe that

Mr. Hermann, in withdrawing so much land temporarily, has profited by the experience of the interior department in other localities, and has set aside a wide area surrounding the lands to be finally created into a reserve in order to forestall and prevent a rush of speculators who would otherwise indulge in a wild scramble to file on or purchase property along the reserve's borders. I have not the slightest doubt in the world that when the Blue mountain forest reserve is finally created by the interior department, it will not include more than one-half of the lands set aside temporarily in Commissioner Hermann's order for withdrawal. "It is the aim of the department, as I understand it, not to cripple the settlement and development of the Strawberry mountain country, but to create a forest reserve here of a sufficient area to conserve the water supply of the numerous streams in that section. "If the people of Grant county and of Eastern Oregon will look at the matter in the right way, they will understand how important is the matter of conserving the water supply of that region before it is eternally too late in order that the vast areas of arid lands in Grant, Harney and Malheur counties, may be eventually reclaimed by irrigation. "It is useless to cry 'Fraud' and 'Boodler' and fight the creation of this reserve because it is bound to be created. The department, acting upon the reports of its competent engineers knows its business and understands the necessity of creating a safeguard against the denuding of the mountain ranges of their timber and the consequent destruction of sources of water supply. "All this rot about 'range wars,' 'timber land grabbers,' 'Heu land script dealers,' etc., counts for little, as the department is in possession of facts, and demands facts in refutation. "What the people who oppose the proposed reserve should do, in order to make their protests against its creation effective, is to employ a competent surveyor to determine accurately the number of acres of timber in the Strawberry mountain country which surround the sources of water supply, and which are necessary for an efficient conservation thereof. A map should be drawn from such field notes, and submitted to the department. In that event I am safe in asserting that the department of the interior will do nothing but what is exactly right and proper in the premises. "Your paper has had much to say recently of the benefits which would accrue to the sheepmen of Eastern Oregon from the creation of this reserve. You have taken pains to point out that owners of sheep are issued permits by the interior department to graze their bands within the limits of the reserve. This is so. But you have taken the stand that on account of this fact the sheepmen are purely selfish in advocating the creation of the reserve. Perhaps this is so. But upon the same grounds the mining men of this section should favor the idea, because with sheep confined to a reserve, the embryonic war brewing between miners and sheepmen on account of the latter trespassing upon mining property, will come to an end. "It is a big proposition, but I am firmly convinced that the department of the interior will in the end do the right thing for all parties concerned, including the farmer, miner, cattlemen and sheepmen."—Baker City Herald.

Prevention of Cruelty.
