## IN DISTRICT COURT

### TWO CRIMINAL CASES COME UP FOR HEARING.

#### Mark Boyd Pleads Guilty to Simple Larceny and Sentence is Suspended—Japs Arraigned on Two Charges—Only One Other Criminal Case.

District court convened this morning. The greater part of the forenoon was taken up with necessary preliminaries.

Only one case was attended to, that of Mark Boyd, charged with larceny. He pleaded guilty to the charge of petty larceny and sentence was suspended.

Boyd will be remembered as the printer who, with Austin Wells, was arrested at Athena a few days ago at the instigation of Charles Alspach, charged with stealing a watch. Wells was arrested simply because he was with Boyd, but was released by the district attorney.

Boyd was held on his own recognizance and was sent to the county hospital suffering from injuries received by falling through a trestle near Helix. Sentence was suspended against him because he had not fully recovered from his injuries. The fact that he found the watch in an outcase and did not try to get rid of it or conceal it when arrested, had considerable weight in his case.

#### The Japs' Trial.

This afternoon S. Suzuki and T. Shogose, the two Japs who made war on the switch crew of the O. R. & N. company in the local yards a few weeks ago, because an engine was bumped into their cars, are up for hearing on the charge of assault with dangerous weapons. They undertook to clean out the switch crew with butcher knives, but were themselves routed with missiles from the hands of the whites. The Japs were arrested, arraigned and bound over to court by Justice Fitz Gerald.

In addition to the charges of assault with dangerous weapons, each will have to face a separate charge of carrying concealed weapons. This charge is for carrying butcher knives which they had on them when arrested.

Only one other criminal case is docketed to come up, that of the state of Oregon vs. Leonard Hines, charged with larceny.

### A NARROW ESCAPE.

#### John McGurney Attacked by a Cow and Left Unconscious.

John McGurney was taken to The Dalles Saturday evening in a very serious condition from the effects of an attack by a cow on the Henry Lorenzen place, south of town, Saturday morning.

Mr. McGurney was cooking for the men working on the Lorenzen place, and Saturday morning the men left him at the house but when they returned to work no dinner was awaiting them, and McGurney was nowhere to be seen. The men began a search to find what had become of him and he was discovered unconscious by a pile of boards in the yard. He was carried into the house and after several minutes working with him the men were able to revive him and he told the following story:

During the forenoon a band of cattle kept coming into the field around the house and he went out several times to drive them away. One of the animals persisted in coming back and he drove it away several times. The last time he picked up a stick and struck the animal, which turned on him in fury. McGurney was tossed into the air and thrown against the ground until he became unconscious. This was the last he knew until revived by the men several hours later.

Mr. McGurney had a very narrow escape and it is a mystery that he escaped being killed outright. While there are no serious external injuries, it is thought that he may be hurt internally.
