Etkman.

Oct 14 -- It is that before long the human body will have no more secrets for the medical man. Up to now only hard bodies, such as a stone or bullet, could be located with the help of the X-rays. But Professor Etkman, member of the Royal Academy of Amsterdam has just discovered a new method by which it is possible to obtain, with the help of the Roentgen rays, the pho-tograph of the body, even during the

working of the organs.
It is, as it were, a kind of cine-matograph of the movements of the heart, or those of the stomach and in-testines during digestion. According to the eminent scientist, it would be possible to ascertain whether the stoppage of the intestines is due to appendicitis, to a growth, or to a twisting or constriction of the bowels or in what way the heart is affected. Indeed, if the discovery of Professor Etkman proves to be what the members of the learned societies of Am sterdam think it is, in other words if the X-rays, instead of being capable of photograpping hard bodies only, as they have hitherto done, can also pho tograph the whole anatomy of the body, there is no hesitation in affirming that the most useful discovery of the age has been made.


