KRUGER AND HIS GENERALS.

The Role of Beggars is Better Than
Extinction.

Utrecht, Holland, Oct. 14.—The
Boer generals who gathered here to
greet Mr. Kruger on the occasion of
his 77th birthday, listened to a brief
address by Mr. Kruger during a
church service. Mr. Kruger said the
generals had only ceased hostilities
in order to prevent the extinction of
their race, and that the assumption
of the role of beggars showed their
desire to save their people. Turning
to the generals, Mr. Kruger said:

"Continue your labors with all hu-
mility and perform your duty as sup-
plicants."

As Mr. Kruger descended from the
pulpit the congregation arose and
sang the hymn, "May the Blessings
of the Lord Rest Upon You."

Pastor Jonker said that although
the Boer national hymn could not be
heard at present, God one day would
permit the Boers to sing, "We are a
Free People."

Pastor Ferhout remarked that the
unity of the Boer people would not
permit them to become servile.

Students of the University presented
to the generals a purse containing
\$400. After the church services the
generals visited Mr. Kruger's home.

General DeWett, referring to the
controversy on the subject of an au-
dience of Boer generals with Emperor
William said his majesty had not in-
vited them, and that hence the gen-
erals had not refused an audience.

General DeWett added:
"If an emperor or king desired to
see us it would be a great honor, and
we should certainly apply to the Brit-
ish minister to introduce us."

Six thousand eight hundred dollars
was subscribed at a meeting here
last night.

PHOTOGRAPH OF A HEART.

Wonderful Discovery Made by Prof.
Etkman.

Amsterdam, Oct. 14.—It is possible
that before long the human body will
have no more secrets for the medical
man. Up to now only hard bodies,
such as a stone or bullet, could be
located with the help of the X-rays.
But Professor Etkman, member of
the Royal Academy of Amsterdam has
just discovered a new method by
which it is possible to obtain, with the
help of the Roentgen rays, the photo-
graph of the body, even during the
working of the organs.

It is, as it were, a kind of cine-
matograph of the movements of the
heart, or those of the stomach and in-
testines during digestion. According
to the eminent scientist, it would be
possible to ascertain whether the
stoppage of the intestines is due to
appendicitis, to a growth, or to a
twisting or constriction of the bowels,
or in what way the heart is affected.
Indeed, if the discovery of Professor
Etkman proves to be what the mem-
bers of the learned societies of Am-
sterdam think it is, in other words,
if the X-rays, instead of being capable
of photographing hard bodies only, as
they have hitherto done, can also pho-
tograph the whole anatomy of the
body, there is no hesitation in affirm-
ing that the most useful discovery of
the age has been made.
