CHINK LOSES MONEY

THUG AT ECHO HOLDS UP
LAUNDRYMAN FOR \$100.

Knocked the Celestial in the Head With a Club and Made a Get-a-Way Boards Train for Pendleton—Sheriff Now Looking for Him.

The officers of Umatilla county are looking for a young man who robbed a Chinaman of \$100 at Echo between 6 and 7 o'clock Tuesday evening.

The identity of the man is not known, but the officers have a description of him. He has been at Echo for several days and a few days ago took some soiled linen to the Chinaman, who runs a laundry, to have it cleaned. When he went back to get his linen the Chinaman delivered the bundle to the young man, who proceeded to change his old clothes for clean linen before leaving the laundry. It is supposed the Chinaman showed his money in making change. At any rate, the young man stepped outside the door and immediately returned with a club in his hand, ordered the Chink to stand and deliver. Instead of doing as commanded, the Chinaman let up a yell which was calculated to bring assistance at once, but when he hollered the hold-up man struck him a heavy blow on the head with the club, knocking him down, and then stuffed his shirt, which he had just removed, into the Chinaman's mouth to stop further outcries. He then went through the fellow's pockets and secured what money they contained.

After the robbery the Chinaman gave the alarm and a posse was immediately made up and a search made for the thug. He was not located, but every effort was made to keep him from boarding a freight train, and getting out of the country.

Regardless of the vigilance of the posse, the young man succeeded in storing himself in a refrigerator car without being observed, and getting out of town. On the way to Pendleton he accosted a brakeman on the train and offered him \$20 to store him away and haul him out of the country. The brakeman refused and the thug told him what he had done. He said that he had quite a tussle with the Chinaman, who was game to the last, and fought desperately to protect his money. He said that instead of getting \$100, he only secured forty odd.

The officers at Echo notified the sheriff and police of this city and the freight train was met at the depot and a careful search made for the thug, but he was not found. Evidently he had become alarmed because the brakeman would not be bought into concealing him, and jumped off the train before reaching this city.

BUTCHER SKIPS OUT.

Henry Kapp, of Athena, Leaves Shop and Creditors Behind.

Athena, Oct. 15.—Considerable comment is being indulged in in this city over the sudden disappearance of Henry Kapp, who has been running a butcher shop here.

Kapp came to this place a little over a month ago and bought out Platzoeder & Minger, of Pendleton, who had a shop established here. He had worked for several months prior to the time of coming here and was apparently a straightforward fellow. Monday he and his wife got their personal effects together and left town, shutting up the shop and leaving everything without trying to dispose of it. It is understood that he had paid the entire amount for the butcher shop and business, but he owes something like \$800 in Pendleton and several bills here. Other than the creditors he left behind, there is no one to mourn for him, as his actions have not been criminal in the least, and in his business dealings seemed to be perfectly straight in every way other than the leaving without bidding his creditors farewell. He had paid a month's rent in advance for the butcher shop building and had a year's rent paid on the slaughter yard.

Why he should so suddenly get out of town without saying anything is not known. He came to Oregon from Washington and to some intimate friends he said that he was going away for a few days and would return, saying that he was going back to his old home. He was industrious and a hard worker, but had one fault, and that was drink.

These will be the three to pass the best papers. The papers will be sent immediately to Washington, D. C., where they will be passed upon and the returns will not be made until a short time prior to the establishment of the free delivery.

A NEW CORPORATION.

The Ross Ice and Cold Storage Company—\$18,000 Capital Stock.

Articles of incorporation for the Ross Ice and Cold Storage Company were filed this afternoon at the court house with J. F. Ross, Ada Ross and Anna M. Markham as incorporators.

The object of this corporation is for the manufacture of artificial ice and handling cold storage and refrigerators. The East Oregonian recently published the news that J. F. Ross would build an \$18,000 ice plant in Pendleton, and have it in operation by the coming of hot weather.

The capital stock of the new corporation is \$18,000, and the stock will be divided into shares at a par of \$100 each.

Boyd Goes to Baker.

Mark Boyd left Tuesday evening for Baker City, accompanied by his mother, who came over to take him home and care for him until he had completely recovered from his injuries received by falling through a trestle from a moving train a few days ago. Boyd is the young man arrested a few days ago at Athena, charged with stealing a watch, but the evidence was such that he was released and sentence suspended. Mrs. Boyd was considerably broken up over her son's trouble.
