## THAT NEW FACTORY

STEPS WILL BE TAKEN TO  
LAND IT HERE.

Athena is in the Field—\$25,000 is  
Asked For From Citizens.

At 4:30 Monday afternoon a meet-  
ing was called of the executive com-  
mittee of the Commercial Association  
and the proposition of W. T. Rigby  
and J. Clove for their combined har-  
vester manufacturing establishment was  
laid before the committee.

The proposition as laid before the  
committee was to the effect that the  
citizens of the town should subscribe  
for \$25,000 of the preferred stock in  
the company which is to be called the  
Rigby-Clove Combine Company.

It is a settled fact that the combined  
machines are a success and the inven-  
tors have decided to manufacture  
them for sale and have them on the  
market for next harvest. To do this  
they realize that there must be but  
little delay. Although the site has not  
yet been selected for the manufactur-  
ing establishment and will not be un-  
til it is seen what the people will do,  
the company has already ordered a  
75-horse power engine and \$2400 worth  
of machinery which will be ready  
as soon as the site is selected upon  
which to install it. Several thousand  
dollars more will be placed in an or-  
der for more machinery at once.

It is the intention of the company  
to incorporate for \$100,000 and all but  
the \$25,000 will be owned by the com-  
pany. This latter amount will be pre-  
ferred stock and it is the intention of  
the promoters to have it sold and will  
guarantee an interest of eight per  
cent to those investing. This is a  
good interest and later the company  
intend to gradually buy this stock  
in until it is all owned by it. In this  
way they claim the man putting  
money into the enterprise cannot  
lose for he is guaranteed his interest  
which is a good rate.

No bonus is asked by the promoters.  
They only prefer to ask that the peo-  
ple take one-fourth of the stock as  
preferred stock which means that this  
is as a first mortgage on the plant  
and the investors will get their in-  
terest out of this regardless of what  
the company makes.

It is estimated that the cost of the  
plant will be about \$30,000. In addi-  
tion to the plant the material to begin  
manufacturing machines will cost an  
additional \$40,000. The plant will  
cover a large area of ground, but the  
location will be selected later. The  
engine room will be the only brick  
building at present although it is the  
intention of the company to eventual-  
ly have all their buildings brick  
wherever they locate. The finishing  
room will be built two stories high.  
In addition to this there will be a  
blacksmith shop, machine shop, foundry  
and pattern shop.

The erection of this manufacturing  
plant will mean a large thing to Pen-  
dleton. In the construction of the  
plant the services of many carpenters  
will be required and after the  
plant is built it will employ from 50  
to 75 men at a monthly pay roll from  
\$8000 to \$3500.

Just what will be done has not been  
decided, but it is likely that a mass  
meeting will be called by the Com-  
mercial Club to see what the people  
think of the proposition. In the mean-  
time the same proposition made to  
Pendleton has been laid before the  
people of Athena. Athena has been  
bidding for the factory and W. G.  
Rigby went to that city today to lay  
the proposition before those interest-  
ed.

### Cause of Sunday's Wreck.

It has been learned since the publi-  
cation of the story of the Sunday  
wreck in the O. R. & N. yards, that  
the wreck was caused by the care-  
lessness of some man in the yards,  
and not from a defective switch. Just  
who is to blame is not known, but it  
is now evident that someone is re-  
sponsible for the accident. The  
switch had been only partly closed,  
and when the engine struck the open  
switch the derailment followed.

### SEEN IN ALBA.

Eight Thousand Dollars Worth of Ore  
in Two Loads.

Alba, Oct. 21.—The sawmill at this  
place is now running in full blast with  
Peter Viebroch as general manager,  
D. E. Coombs is head sawyer, Lon  
Down edger, and M. E. Sturdivant,  
engineer.

One hundred and forty-four head  
of cattle left here last week for the  
Sound, 110 head of these belonging  
to Fred Martin and 34 head to J.  
Terry. The price paid for these cat-  
tle was \$3.75 per hundred delivered  
in Pendleton. They were purchased  
by J. C. Lonergan for the Pacific Meat  
Company at Tacoma.

More freight is going over the  
roads between Pendleton and the  
John Day this fall than ever before,  
but the most valuable loads to pass  
through here on its way to Pendleton  
went through Friday night. These  
were four-horse loads of ore from the  
Badger mine. The ore was concentra-  
ted and sacked in 125-pound sacks.  
The total value of the two loads was  
\$8000. Each wagon contained two  
tons of the concentrates and the  
teamsters claim that the roads are  
good between Pendleton and the Su-  
sanville country.
