GENERAL NEWS.

The latest report from Venezuela denies the victory of General Castro. It takes \$950 in silver currency of the Philippines to secure \$400 in American gold.

General Davis has ordered a reform in discipline and dress of officers and soldiers in the Philippines.

One thousand glass blowers at Washington, Pa., went on strike yesterday for recognition of their union.

By a tie vote of 32 to 32 the Danish rigsdag refused to sell the Danish West Indies to the United States.

By a late decision of the supreme court at Washington, the Japanese are not entitled to citizenship in the United States.

The Hayti rebellion has broken out again and women and children at Cape Haytian are seeking refuge on U. S. S. Commander.

The people of the Windward district in Jamaica are appealing for food and shelter in consequence of the eruption of Mt. Soufriere.

Southern Oregon is again excited over the prospects of the construction of the Salt Lake & Coos Bay railroad.

The mountains of Douglas and Coos counties are said to be full of deer and a great number are being slaughtered.

About 8000 tons of beets have arrived so far at the factory of the Amalgamated Sugar Company, of La Grande.

Coal is now being mined in Morrow county. For the first time in its history, the residents of Heppner will be furnished coal for fuel.

GETTING A RECORD

MADE A GOOD START FOR THE PENITENTIARY.

Lester Lewis, Unable to Pay a Fine. Now in Jail—Figured in Two Causeless Fights Last Night.

Lester Lewis, who has been figuring quite frequently in police and justice court for assaults, not able to pay a fine of \$20, is now in the city jail.

The fine was imposed this morning by Judge Fitz Gerald on two charges. The first was on the charge of assault and battery on Charles Gardner. It seems that Lewis had a grudge against Gardner and they met at 8 o'clock last night in the barber shop, on the corner of Court and Main streets, where Lewis started the fight. Gardner got out of Lewis' way as quickly as possible, but not until they had broken a large mirror and done a little other damage. Gardner appeared before Judge Fitz Gerald and swore out a warrant for the arrest of Lewis.

In the meantime, Lewis, who was well filled up with whisky, went into Schmidt's saloon and started another row with a young man by the name of Kelly. They were parted and Lewis stepped up to the bar to take a drink with a friend when a brother of young Kelly took a hand in the affair. The fight waxed warm and furious for several minutes and Kelly got considerably the best of the encounter. Lewis' face was badly bruised and cut and this morning his eyes were black and swelled out of proportion.

The police whistle was sounded and the officers parted the fighters. They were taken into police headquarters where an effort was made by his friends to raise a \$40 bond for Lewis. In this they failed and he had to go to jail where he remained over night. The Kelly brothers were also locked up and for their part in the affair were fined \$5 each. They paid their fine and went on their way, but Lewis could not raise the necessary \$20.

A RANK FRAUD.

Woman Beggar Solicited Money From Pendleton People Yesterday.

A woman giving her name as Mrs. Frederick Peterson, with a brood of five small children tagging at her heels, was in town Thursday and succeeded in gathering in a goodly number of shewels from those charitably inclined.

Since Mrs. Peterson left town, it has been learned that she is simply traversing the country working the same gag in each town she passes through and that she is a rank fraud. To work her graft to perfection, however, she should get hold of a map and study the geography of the country a little. Those with half an eye could see from her hard luck story here that she was a fraud. She said her home was in Pasco, the rendezvous of toughs, and that she was on her way to Spokane, where her husband, who had been a railroad man, was in the hospital with a bad siege of rheumatism which the doctors announced would kill him.
