

## GEORGIA SHERIFF

MOSCOW AFTER NEGRO.

Speaks of His Country and His Trip -Highly Pleased With Pacific Country,

Sheriff W. W. Sutherland, of Cofcounty, Georgia, accompanied by L. Tanner, assistant cashier of the Citizens' Bank of Douglas, Ga., is in

town today on their way to Moscow. They are after Will Brunner, colored, who shot K. White, a white man, down in cold blood in August of 1901. Brunner had no cause for shooting White, who was a peaceable citizen and after the negro killled White he fied to the West. He was traced for several miles by the officers and surrounded in a house, but managed to make his escape to the brush and after receiving a volley of shots from the officers, succeeded in making his escape.

That was the last heard of the ne gro until recently he went to Moscow and made statements which implicated him with crime. He was then arrested by the chief of police of Moscow and confessed to being the murderer of a man in the Source. Sheriff Southerland had been camping on the negro's trail for the past several months and the officers of Moscow having been notified of the crime and being given a description of Brunner, they wired the sheriff of Coffee county stating that they had the man wanted. Sheriff Southerland and Mr. Turner started immediately after him and have been eight days on the

Mr. Southerland was asked what would be done with the negro when he got him back to Georgia, and he replied that he would undoubtedly be hanged according to law. He did not state that the fellow might be strung up by the infuriated mob, but as this is usually the procedure with such fellows in the South, this is the kind of a reception the negro may re-

In speaking of his trip and what he thought of this country, Sheriff Southerland said:

"We left home eight days ago and have had a very pleasant trip. We are in no hurry and are looking over Gregg's old reliable Moca and Java the country we go through and ex pect to remain here several days and take a thorough look over this coun try to see what it is like. Our man is in jail and as I have the requisition papers for his return, which ment at Tacoma. need only be signed by the governor, we will not hurry to start back." Sheriff Southerland said be

Great Ore Body Opening at 300-Foot Level.

A great ore body is opening on the of the Golconda. The level north drift on the east vein entered the area of the rich shoot some time Hair pins, combs, safety pins, pock-etbooks, curling irons, hair brushes and everything else in notions on the and everything else in notions on the intersection, by cross-cut from this drift, the vein is 15 feet wide, and on both walls is very fine quartz. The whole of the vein is not pay ore, but the heavy streaks on the walls are widening till it seems that most of it will be shortly. The width of the ore at that depth and the rapid improvement with the north drift afford the best example of what the Golconda is to be at a depth. With the great enlargement of the ore body observed between the 200 and 300 as an index it is quite certain that on the 400 and 500 when the north drifts progress some further, the ore body will be of proportions never seen in the Golconda before.—Sumpter American.
