WILL MAKE LEATHER TIES.

Claimed That Will Save \$5,000 a Mile
After Ties Are Once Laid.

Springfield, Mass., Oct. 24.—The lo-
cal capitalists who are behind the F.
W. Dannel Composite Leather Com-
pany, which has just been incor-
porated for the manufacture of leather
railroad ties and paving blocks, are
receiving many requests for informa-
tion from railroad officials whose in-
terest has been awakened by the an-
nouncement of the company's plans.
If the invention is what is claimed
for it by the company it promises to
solve the question of the future sup-
ply of ties, which for years has been
worrying the railroads.

It is claimed that the leather tie
will hold a spike better than any
other material, that it is impervious
to the weather, is free from knots,
checks and decayed spots, that all
ties are uniform in size and quality,
that neither the rail nor fishplate will
cut into it, that it is as nearly noise-
less as a tie can be, and that it will
outwear six or eight wood ties. Its
elasticity, it is further claimed, make
it far superior to any metal tie that
could be made. It is said that the
railroads will save from \$5,000 to \$7,
000 a mile after the ties are once laid
in a well-made roadbed. It is also
claimed that a tie can be adjusted as
easily as wood, and that it will take
a firmer roadbed around the curve.

The tie is made of waste leather
combined with chemicals, and both
can be obtained in almost unlimited
quantities. The process of manufac-
ture is a simple one, and six ties will
be made at each drop of the press,
which will be under hydraulic pres-
sure.

Ready For Wilson's Installation.

Princeton, N. J., Oct. 24.—Final ar-
rangements have been perfected for
the ceremonies tomorrow accompa-
nying the installation of the new presi-
dent of Princeton University, Dr.
Woodrow Wilson. The event promises
to be the most notable in the history
of the famous institution. Besides
the representatives from all the lead-
ing colleges and universities of this
country and Canada, those in attend-
ance will include eminent financiers,
scientists, judges, clergymen and
others. Those who have signified
their intention to be present, and
some of whom are already here, in-
clude J. Pierpont Morgan, Henry C.
Frick, William Dean Howells, Sam-
uel L. Clemens, Dr. Albert Shaw, for-
mer speaker Thomas B. Reed, and
Robert T. Lincoln.

CALIFORNIA FOREST RESERVE.

Commissioner Hermann Sets Aside
6,000,000 Acres of Timber.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 24.—Ap-
proximately 6,000,000 acres of land
in Northern California were provision-
ally withdrawn from the public land
area for the creation of forest re-
serves under orders issued lately
by Commissioner Hermann, of the
General Land office. The order was
issued by the direction of the secre-
tary of the interior. The segregation
of these tracts were recommended
after investigation by the general sur-
vey. A further survey will be made,
pending which the final orders estab-
lishing the reservations are deferred.
The land involved in the order, as
now contemplated, is to be divided
into four reserves, as follows:

The Klamath river forest reserve,
embracing 3780 square miles; the
Mount Shasta reservation, 3024 square
miles; the Lassen Park reserve, 1693
square miles, and the Diamond Moun-
tain, 872 square miles. The location
of the respective areas is indicated
by their names. On these lands an
immense rush recently has been made
for timber land by speculators, and
complaints have been numerous from
men who settled under the mining
law that others were locating mining
claims under the forest land se-
lections, claiming the lands on which
these mineral locations had been
made were not mineral in character.
