He will have about 100 acres in alfalfa. The hay product he expects to feed to cattle and in addition will purchase feed. It is Mr. Barrett's intention to go into the stock business on an extensive scale, and a goodly share of his attention will be devoted to hogs. His land is admirably situated for a stock ranch, and with his mountain summer range he is equipped to get all possible out of stock.

Mrs. J. W. Smith and Mrs. W. R. Taylor Saturday visited friends in Pendleton, among them Mrs. W. S. Perry.

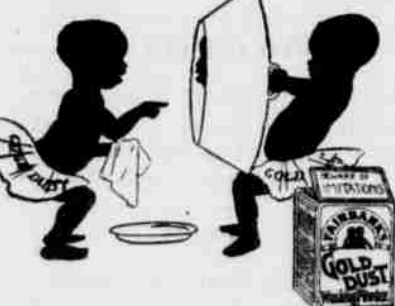

THAT SPECIAL SESSION.

The Reasons and Wherefore by a Democratic Sheet.

There is a great deal of needless circumlocution these days over a plain matter of public duty.

All know that a regular session of the Oregon legislature, "as she is carried on" is a "holy terror."

All know that in 40 days, the shortest session of any state in the Union, there is barely time to pass the appropriation bills, and even that is done in a huddle-muddle underhanded manner, savoring of grand larceny.

The first ten days of the session is taken in organizing, and the rest in fighting over who shall be senator.

There are three great matters that need to be disposed of in an orderly way—the Referendum, a flat salary bill and the Lewis and Clark exposition.

These things should not be thoroughly beslimed in the whirlpool of personal grafts and political dirty linen, called the regular session.

The people have voluntarily petitioned for a special session. The Oregonian said 500 names were signed to petitions. The Statesman says 932. The fact remains that a special session was asked for. No petitions were circulated but through The Journal.

No man need have petitioned for a special session. The paramount justice and necessity of a special session stands upon its own merit.

Just why the figures are given out about the special session petition no one can tell. They are not given out by any one who wants a special session, but by those who want the grafts and disorders to go on.

Those petitioning for a special session are not interested in any aspirant for senator or any graft. They are citizens and taxpayers, and their names are clean. The slur that many of them are from Marion county is gratuitous.

From a political standpoint the democratic party has everything to gain by the failure of the republicans to put flat salaries and direct legislation into effect.

No friend and well-wisher of the republican party can want to see it guilty of neglect or treason to great reforms.

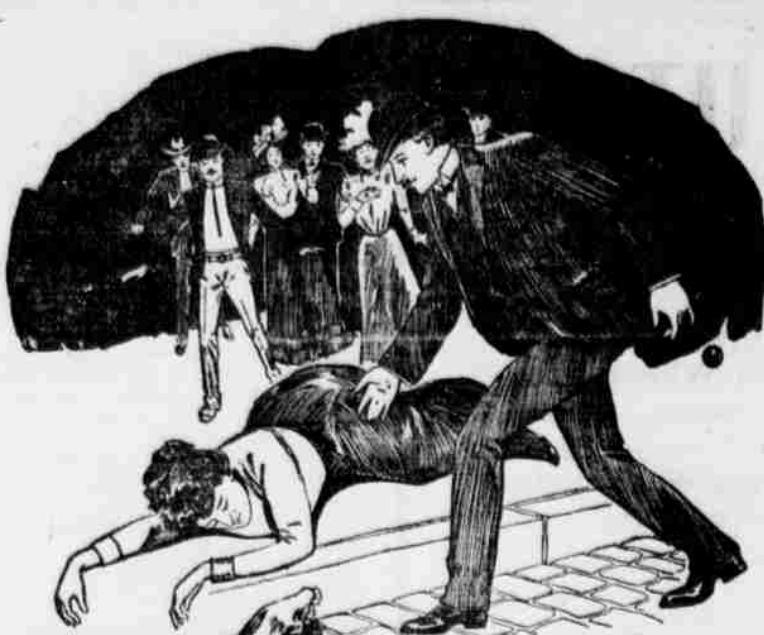
But the party has such a majority in Oregon that its leaders imagine nothing will ever turn the people against them. Instead of conceding a few reforms in a decent, orderly manner, they must drive the people to the last ditch of desperation.

That is the logic of prurient partisanship. That is the genius of Bourbonism. It blindly pursues its scavenging methods until it becomes fatally poisoned from an overdose of spoils.

Let alleged republican politicians beware how they trifle with the people on matters where there is no particular division.—Salem Journal.
