## LABOR FEDERATIONS

### HISTORY OF GROWTH AND SPREAD OF MOVEMENT.

**A Laborer Who Struck in Early** Times Was Branded and Became a Slave for Life—Ears Cut Off for Joining Unions.

The labor union movement originated in England, during the reign of King Edward VI.

A vigorous contest early arose between employers and employed; the former relying on coercive measures, the latter forced into voluntary combinations. In fact it was the combination of masters which led to the combination of workmen. The act passed under King Edward was that any one who refused to work at statute prices was adjudged a vagabond and branded with the letter "V." If he had the hardihood to escape by flight he was branded with the letter "S" and became a slave for life; if he still resisted his fate he was hanged. And, furthermore, artisans and laborers convicted for the third time of having joined "confederacies" determining what labor they would or would not do, had their ears cut off.

### Industrial Despotism Routed.

By this combined resistance political and industrial despotism has been routed and the area of freedom extended and the hours of labor have been reduced in some cases one-half. It is an established historical fact, that where unionism has been weak wages have been low.

As a matter of fact since that time the laborer with more hours of leisure have reached a higher standard of comfort and rose in importance and worth as citizens until today they have a broadened vision and keener intellect and have rose above the restrictions of single trade "confederacies" to the more comprehensive idea of the general trade federation.

### First Organization.

On August 20, 1866, the year following the close of our late civil war, delegates from 60 labor unions met in Baltimore and founded a permanent national organization known as the "National Labor Union." Subsequent conventions were held in different places until 1872, when they met in Columbus, Ohio, and made a great mistake by nominating a presidential ticket. The great financial crisis of 1873 followed and the resources of the unions were drained and suspension decreased their members.

At length the old spirit revived and on November 15, 1881, they met at Pittsburgh, Pa., and did not separate until they had established the Federation of Organized Trades and Labor Unions of the United States and Canada.

### The Last Convention.

Subsequent conventions followed until December 5, 1901, when they met at Scranton, Pt., with 310 delegates present representing 250 organizations. Nine hundred and sixteen charters were issued by the American Federation of Labor and 2140 by the affiliated national and international organizations and a gain in membership of 305,410 reported. A few resolutions were adopted, among them Chinese exclusion was demanded and means for better organization were provided; renewed efforts to abolish child labor in the South directed and other resolutions too numerous to mention were adopted.

The object and aim of the American Federation of Labor is to render employment and the means of subsistence less precarious by securing to the workers an equitable share of the fruits of their labor.

Union Not Illegal.  
The mine operators are making the

ple that labor organizations are illegal and unjust. But they are no more illegal than any other organization or corporation. A union is formed for the protection of its own interests and so is any corporation. The United States is but a great union with President Roosevelt at its head and as long as the reins of government are in the hands of the rough-riding labor unions of the United States need have no fear.

The great trust magnates are beginning to see their mistake and are gaining a little notoriety by their compulsory acts of charity.

The next great politician in the democratic party to be looked up to is Tom L. Johnson. He is reading the signs of the times and is not behind them.
