# First Organization.

On August 20, 1866, the year following the close of our late civil war, delegates from 60 labor unions met in Baltimore and founded a permanent national organization known as the "National Labor Union." Subsequent conventions were held in different places until 1872, when they met in Columbus, Ohio, and made a great-mistake by nominating a presidential ticket. The great financial crisis of 1873 followed and the resources of the unions were drained and suspension decreased their members.

At length the old spirit revived and on November 15, 1881, they met at Pittsburg, Pa., and did not separate until they had established the Federation of Organized Trades and Labor Unions of the United States and Ca nada

# The Last Convention,

Subsequent conventions followed until December 5, 1901, when they met at Scranton, Pt., with 310 dele-gates present representing 250 organizations. Nine hundred and sixteen charters were issued by the American Federation of Labor and 3140 by the affiliated national and inter-national organizations and a gain in member-ship of 305,410 reported. A few serolutions were adopted, among Chinese exclusion was demanded and means for better organization were provided; renewed efforts to abolish child labor in the South directed and other resolutions too numerous to mention were adopted,

The object and aim of the Ameri-can Federation of Labor is to render employment and the means of subsistance less precarious by securing to the workers an equitable share of the fruits of their labor.
