COUNTY INSTITUTE

INTERESTING SESSION BY
TEACHERS TOMORROW.

Prominent Lecturers Will be Present
—Nearly 200 Teachers are Expected to be Present.

The Umatilla County Teachers' Institute will open at the court house in this city tomorrow.

The day work will begin at 9 o'clock in the forenoon and in the evening the noted Jewish Rabbi, Dr. Wise, of Portland, will be here and deliver a lecture. Dr. Wise is considered one of the ablest orators and best lecturers on educational subjects in the Northwest and no one should miss hearing him. Thursday evening a lecture will be given by Rev. Dr. Sanderson, recently of British Columbia. He is also a man of exceptional ability as a lecturer and will no doubt draw a large crowd.

Preparations are all completed by County Superintendent Nowlin to make this one of the most interesting and profitable institutes ever held in the county. There are no less than 150 teachers in Umatilla county in actual service in the school rooms, and all told there are 200 in the county who hold certificates. It is expected that nearly all of these will attend the institute. The law requires that all actually teaching shall attend these institutes and all the schools of the county will be closed the rest of this week.

While the day work will not be especially interesting to outsiders, everybody is cordially invited to attend at all times. The evening lectures will be highly interesting to everyone who is interested in educational work, and packed houses are expected to greet these lecturers Wednesday and Thursday nights.

Friday evening there will be no lecture. As Friday's work will close the institute, many of the teachers will leave for their homes immediately, and for this reason no arrangements have been made for exercises on that evening.

Morrow County Sheep Market.

The sheep market is rather quiet just now, but is looking upward, and as a consequence a great many sheepmen in Morrow county are unwilling to let go of their surplus at present prices. Mr. Tom Matlock, an extensive woolgrower of this county, informed The Times that the present price of lambs is \$1.65 to \$1.75; yearling, \$2.25; two and three-year-old wethers, \$2.70, and ewes, \$2.25 to \$2.50. The condition of sheep, in general, is fine, he says, and he expects prices to advance. However, if the price does not reach a satisfactory point, the Morrow county sheepmen will not be at all embarrassed, as they have plenty of feed to take their flocks through the winter in good shape.—Heppner Times.

Decree Granted.

In the case of Ben F. Ogle vs. D. A. Hendricks and Julia McAllister, the decree was granted as prayed. This is a case which grew out of a contract for the sale of lot 4, in block 6, Richardson's addition to Athena. The allegations were that defendants agreed to pay \$600 for the lot and the time expired without the money being forthcoming. Plaintiff then brought suit to again clear his title. Carter & Raley were attorneys for plaintiff.

DAMAGE \$125,000.

Threatened at One Time to Destroy the Entire Southern Portion of the City—A High Wind Blowing.
Cumberland, Md., Oct. 28.—Fire threatened to destroy the entire southern portion of the city for a time this afternoon, but it is now believed to be under control. The South Cumberland Glass Works and the Berger plant have already been destroyed. A high wind is blowing. The damage to the two plants alone will amount to \$125,000.
