HEARD IN WESTON.

Pioneer Dead—Field Corn Good—An
Exciting Accident.

Jesse Melton, an Oregon pioneer,
was buried Sunday in the Weston
cemetery, services being conducted
by Rev. W. S. Payne. Mr. Melton had
been confined to his bed for several
months and his demise was not unex-
pected. He died at the home of his
daughter, Mrs. B. F. Winn, northeast
of Weston. He was 67 years of age
and well known all over Eastern Ore-
gon, where he had a host of friends.
He leaves two daughters and one son,
his wife having died several years ago.

People of the Weston territory are
beginning to turn their attention
more each year to growing field corn.
This is getting to be quite a crop
and is being used for feeding pur-
poses. C. W. Courtney, proprietor of
the Weston Meat Market, has pur-
chased the growth of 30 acres from
Ed Simpson and Henry Waddingham,
and will fatten his beef cattle on it.
Mr. Waddingham's corn yielded 35
bushels to the acre.

Mack Cockburn experienced a very
exciting runaway a few days ago.
He was coming down the steep grade
near the Diggins place with a four-
horse load of lumber when the bind-
ing chain broke and let the lumber
slide off onto the horses. He could
not hold the team and rolled off the
wagon to save himself, preferring to
let the wagon and horses take care
of themselves in such a predicament
rather than risk his own neck by
staying with them. The team made
a break down the mountain and piled
up in the ditch at the foot. When
Mr. Cockburn reached the wagon he
could not see the animals and thought
they had broke loose and gone on.
After a closer look, however, he dis-
covered them in the ditch completely
hid from view with lumber. One of
the horses had a broken shoulder,
but the other three were only slight-
ly scratched. Mr. Cockburn was not
injured.

Milton Swaggart, for 15 years a
raiser of fine blooded hogs, was in
town from his ranch. He said that
he finds blooded hogs very profit-
able and will have almost 100 head to
turn off in a few weeks.

the Walla Walla high school team.

Georgia Veterans in Reunion.
Columbus, Ga., Oct. 28.—This city
is gay with flags and bunting in honor
of the Confederate veterans of Geor-
gia, whose fourth annual state reunion
is in progress. The gathering was
formally opened at 10 o'clock this
morning with a large attendance of
veterans and their friends. The vis-
itors were welcomed by L. C. Levy,
speaking for the local societies, and
by Captain Peter Preer, on behalf of
the Sons of Veterans. To these ad-
dresses response for the visitors was
made by General C. A. Evans, division
commander. The remainder of the
opening session was taken up with
reports, committee appointments and
other routine business. Interspersed
with selections of music. This after-
noon was given over to brigade meet-
ings and reunions of various com-
panies and regiments. Tomorrow
will take place the annual parade,
which promises to be of more than
ordinary interest owing to the large
number of participants.

Venezuela's Independence Day.
Caracas, Oct. 28.—Today was vene-
zuela's independence day, the anni-
versary of the birth of Simon Bolivar.
Owing to the disturbed political con-
dition the celebration was less gen-
eral than has been the custom, about
the only observance in the capital
being the decoration of the famous
liberator's tomb.
