RAISE THEIR PRICE.

Colombia Now Wants \$10,000,000 for
the Right to the Panama Canal.

Washington, Oct. 29.—The long-ex-
pected response of the Colombian
government to the proposition made
by the state department for the ne-
gotiation for a canal treaty on the
lines of the Spooner act has reached
Washington, and was presented to
the state department by Mr. Herran,
secretary of the Colombian legation.
It is difficult to learn the exact na-
ture of this communication, but it is
known that it is not altogether an un-
qualified acceptance of the state de-
partment's proposition. It is, how-
ever, friendly and dignified in tone,
and does not close the negotiations
by any means, though it unquestion-
ably sets back the date of final agree-
ment by opening up new topics for
argument.

For one thing, the Colombian gov-
ernment is now entirely dissatisfied
with the small amount of the payment
to be made to it by the United States
under the terms of the protocol, which
it is proposed to use as the basis for
the treaty. This sum is \$7,000,000.
Colombia wants at least \$10,000,000.
Moreover, the original proposal look-
ed to await 14 years before beginning
the payment of annual rental, the
amount of which was to be fixed then
by mutual agreement. Colombia now
asks the United States to agree at
once upon a lump yearly payment of
\$600,000, which will largely increase
the immediate cost of the enterprise.
The Colombian government clings to
its contention that it has no constitu-
tional authority to alienate any Col-
ombian territory, and reiterates that
the best it can do to meet the lan-
guage of the Spooner act, which looks
to perpetual control by the United
States over the canal strip, is to make
a 100-year lease, with a distinct stip-
ulation that the same shall be re-
newed by the United States at the
expiration of the first century.

TO LOG BURNED TIMBER.

Forests Swept by Fires to Be Cut Up
Into Lumber at Once.

Elma, Wash., Oct. 28.—The Henry
McCleary Mill & Logging Company,
eight miles east of here, is enlarging
its business and is intending to do a
great deal of work this winter. Mr.
McCleary has recently bought a new
donkey engine that has just arrived,
and will in a few weeks procure an-
other one.

Mr. McCleary says that much of the
timber scorched in the fire of Sep-
tember will be used up this winter
into lumber, thus saving it. This
lumber, it is asserted, will in no wise
be inferior to other green lumber.
Buc should it be left standing and die
as much of it would, it would not be
fit for lumber.

MAN KILLED AT NORTH YAKIMA.

In a Spirit of Bravado the Unknown
Said He Would Not Leave Track
Until Train Whistled.

North Yakima, Wash., Oct. 29.—An
unknown man was run down and kill-
ed by the west-bound North Coast
Limited seven miles south of here at
2 p. m. Monday. The man had left
here to go to Simco to work for David
Bryson. He saw the train coming
and in a jest to a man who was with
him said he would not leave the track
till the train whistled.

The remains were brought here for
interment.

Fatal Fall.

Tacoma, Oct. 28.—Captain John E.
Kenny, marine surveyor for Lloyds,
was fatally injured yesterday morn-
ing by falling 20 feet into the hold
of the British ship Pass of Balhama.
He died at a hospital later. Captain
Kenny was 85 years of age.

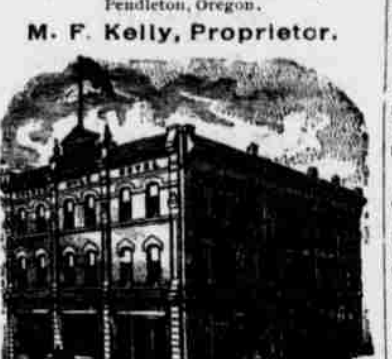
