Continuing, he discoursed the subject from a technical point of view, which was very instructive and listened to with close attention.

Miss Effie Patterson then gave exercises in free-hand sketching, thoroughly demonstrating her skill as a teacher and artist.

This was followed by Roy Conklin in a callsthetic exercise, and Professor Robinson in a lecture on "Geography—Making Use of Environment."

The institute then adjourned until this evening, when Dr. Wise will lecture on the subject; "Shakespeare as a Moral Teacher."

He seems to be pretty well satisfied here."
