GENERAL NEWS.

The revolutionists occupy the rail road lines at Panama. Government troops left Colon and Panama Saturday and will attack the rebels at the same time.

Heather Bloom, a horse owned by Howard Willets, broke the world's record Saturday at the horse show in Chicago by jumping seven feet and eight inches.

Stewart Kyle, the 16-year-old son of U. S. Surveyor-General Kyle, of Reno Nev., was accidentally shot while hunting with a companion Saturday afternoon. He died that evening.

Nicaragua is now on the eve of an outbreak. All of the members of President Zelaya's cabinet, with the exception of one have tendered their resignation. The cause of the cabinet's action has not been made public.

The French mine operators continue their negotiations with the striking miners without result. M. Hasiely, the socialist deputy has telegraphed Premier Combes asking him to arrange for arbitration without any further delay.

Vermont publishers have received orders to forward thousands of papers to Iowa. These papers are used to wrap up Iowa-made, but Vermont-labeled maple syrup—a product compounded of hickory bark and glucose, made into cakes the size and shape of the Vermont product, wrapped in newspapers published in that state, labeled "Pure Vermont Maple Sugar." Even the elect are deceived.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The Rock Island is seeking a route from Colorado Springs to the coast.

Spokane policemen have requested an increase of salary from \$75 to \$80 per month, including uniform.

Troop E, Third U. S. Cavalry, has been transferred from Yosemite National Park, California, to Boise City, Idaho.

The saddle tree factory of Leister Bros., Portland, was destroyed by fire yesterday morning. Loss \$1500, no insurance.

Stewart Hanna hauled 161 sacks of oats, weighing 13,685 pounds, from Steptoe Butte to Colfax, this week, with a four-horse team.

The mammoth new hotel at Hot Lake, Or., will be completed by December 1. It is a brick and stone structure, and will cost \$12,000.

A man named Iverson, who was ejected from a Whatcom street car, for not paying his fare, was found dead beside the track yesterday morning.

John F. Cupid, a well-known mining man of Eastern Oregon, died in Sumpter, November 1, and was buried at La Grande under the auspices of the Masonic fraternity.

Sumpter contributed \$765 to the relief fund of the anthracite coal miners, through a member of the coal miners' union, who has been working in the Baker County gold mines.

The steamer Tremont, sailed from Tacoma on November 2, on her maiden voyage. She is bound for Japan and the Philippines and her cargo consists of flour, valued at \$450,000.

The Catholic Times, published by E. J. McAvoy, at Spokane, will make its appearance on November 15.

The registration in Ada county, Idaho, the county in which Boise City is located, is 300 more this year than 1900.

John Grete, an Oregon pioneer, of 1861, died this week in Silver City. He operated a pack train in 1865, between Umatilla Landing and Boise Basin, and was one of the discoverers of gold in the John Day country. He was a charter member of the Masonic lodge in Silver City and was buried under the auspices of that order. He was born in Hanover, Germany, in 1832.

ORDERS MERGED

PIONEERS AND ORDER OF WASHINGTON JOIN.

Pendleton to Be One of the Principal Headquarters of the New Organization in Oregon.

Butte, Mont., Nov. 4.—The meeting of Maguire Encampment No. 3, Pioneers of the Pacific, held last evening in I. O. G. T. hall in Broadway, was the most largely attended of any in the history of the order, with the exception of the night of the institution, years ago.

The importance of the business transacted justified the large attendance. After the usual routine work had been transacted, the encampment in a body decided to affiliate with the Order of Washington, and a union of that order was instituted.

The name chosen was Treasure State Union No. 159, Order of Washington.

The Order of Washington and the Pioneers of the Pacific are two incorporated bodies, with headquarters at Portland and Pendleton, Or., respectively, with a membership of 14,000 and 4000. Several weeks ago the two supreme bodies decided to merge, and the action of Maguire encampment last evening was in line with the action proposed by the supreme officers.

The next step will be the merger of Laurel Union No. 66, Order of Washington, with the new union just instituted. The members of both unions have expressed a desire to form one large compact local union, which will start off with a membership of 125. A special agent of the orders has been in Butte the past week, planning the work, and the result has exceeded his expectations. He will remain in Montana a month, merging the orders at Anaconda, Helena, Great Falls and Missoula.

CLOSE ELECTION.

Hacks and Carriages Are Busy Carrying Voters to the Polls.

Walla Walla, Nov. 4.—The most interesting election held in this county in several years, is being carried on today, when a battle royal is being fought between the republicans and democrats, over the election of three members of the legislature and a county ticket. Normally, the county is republican by about 300, but this time there is considerable disaffection, and the democrats have made an effort to widen the breach between the factions of the party, and the hope is entertained that democrats will be elected in several places on the ticket. Another feature is the fight made by Levi Ankeny to keep the county in line with the administration, and if possible send three republicans to the legislature, men who are known to be favorable to his candidacy for the senate.

All over the city hacks and carriages are busy carrying voters to the polls, and the country precincts are reported as putting up a lively scrap. A large number of men are engaged in advancing the cause of the republican and democratic tickets, and altogether the election is unusually warm and lively. The ticket is a large one, and will be slowly counted in most precincts. It may be late tomorrow morning before the result is known in this county.

The Chinese government has sent a number of native students to this country, to take post-graduate course in various educational institutions. On their return to China they will occupy important public positions.

Secretary of State John Hay has presented a memorial chapel to a Westminster, Conn., school, in memory of his son, Adelbert Hay, formerly United States consul at Pretoria, South Africa.

Walla Walla, Nov. 4.—Everybody is rejoicing over the rain which fell Sunday night, all over the Walla Walla valley. Nearly an inch of water was recorded at the weather office, the heaviest downpour in months. The soil is thoroughly soaked and in a day or two fall work will begin in earnest. The fields were in ideal condition for a heavy rain, and it came just when people wanted it the most. In some places early seeding is reported peeping through the surface, but the growth has been slow on account of a lack of moisture. In many fields seeding has been delayed by the farmer in hopes that rain would come and cause the grain to sprout quickly after it had been sown. With conditions as they are now, nothing is to be desired save bright sunshine.
