Snow Near Walla Walla.

Walla Walla, Nov. 4.—White and
cold with a carpet of snow near the
foothills, a dozen miles from this city,
the Blue Mountains present a chilly
appearance today. Following the rain
of Sunday a cold wave came and
along the mountain sides the rain was
turned to snow, and it fell to a depth
of two or three inches. The air is
quite chilly, and complaint is heard
of the need of fires, occasioned largely
by the presence of snow so close to
the city. It is unusual to see
snow so close to this city so early in
the season, but old-timers say it
indicates an early winter and also a
timely spring.

Red Men's Carnival.

Walla Walla, Nov. 4.—The Red
Men of this city are preparing to give
a second carnival during the month
of February, when for a week the
people of the city will be entertained
at Armory hall in the most deli-
cious fashion. The first carnival was
given last winter and it proved so
successful that another has been plan-
ned and will be given after the holi-
day season. Committees have been
named and the work of preparation

packing plant, which is now being
planned for that city. A 50x300 foot
stone building will be erected near
the O. R. & N. tracks. The most im-
proved machinery, operated by elec-
tric power, will be put in and the
plant is to be complete in every de-
tail.

WOOL MEN MEET

FIRST LOCAL UNION
—UNDER NEW LAWS.

Enthusiastic Meeting in Pine and

Eagle Valley—Baker County in its
Infancy—Need of Transportation.
J. H. Gwinn, secretary of the Wool-

growers Association, who has just re-
turned from an extended visit through
Eastern Oregon, reports the organiza-
tion of the first local Woolgrowers'
Association in Oregon under the new
constitution and by-laws, adopted by
the recent meeting of the state asso-
ciation in this city. This local or-
ganization is in Baker county and in-
cludes the woolgrowers of Pine and
Eagle valleys.

Mr. Gwinn says the woolgrowers in
that section are very enthusiastic and
at a called meeting turned out to a
man. After listening to an outline
of the plans of the state organization,
and to other matters of vital impor-
tance now before the sheepmen of Or-
egon, they effected a splendid local
organization, at which every one ex-
pressed himself as being heartily in
accord with the plans of the state
association.

Mr. Gwinn is highly pleased with
that portion of Eastern Oregon, and
says the country is only in its infan-
cy and with increased transportation
facilities, the output of livestock and
farm products can be doubled.

CLASS IN BIBLE STUDY.

Begins Friday at the Men's Resort
Conducted by Prof. Wilson.

Beginning on Friday evening of this
week, Prof. W. S. A. Wilson will con-
duct a Men's Normal course in Bible
study. This class will meet every
Friday night. The course covers two
years. A course of talks to men will
be given by the various pastors of the
city on Sunday afternoons at 4 o'clock.
Rev. Dr. Warner will speak next Sun-
day afternoon, Nov. 9th. Robert
Hotchkiss, of Galveston, Texas, has
been employed as assistant superin-
tendent and will have charge of the
rooms every day and evening. The
resort has had a steady, healthy
growth from the first and now has 108
members.

The rooms are located in the Des-
plain block on Court street and the
public are invited to call at any time
and see what is being done. The
board feel very grateful for the hearty
support of the business men and
friends who by their gifts have made
it possible to start this good work.
