A NOTED SWINDLER

A FORGER, SWINDLER, BIG-AMIST AND CONFIDENCE MAN.
 A Short Historical Sketch of an Old-time Criminal Who Has Operated in Many Parts of the United States—Is Now in Australia.
 Chicago, Ill., Nov. 7.—Advices from Australia, tells of the arrest there of Arthur Bentley Worthington on the charge of obtaining a large sum of money by false pretenses from a woman who had become interested in his teachings and work as a leader of a spiritualistic movement called "Students of Truth."
 These advices give the local police their first information as to the whereabouts of a man who, a quarter of a century ago, was one of the best-known criminals in the United States, but of whom nothing has been heard or known for many years.
 Worthington was variously known in this country as a lawyer, banker, political orator, real estate operator, spiritualist, literateur, mining speculator and organizer, bigamist and confidence man generally. Many of the confidence games now well known to the general public were originated by him and he is known to have made thousands of dollars out of his schemes. The police records of 30 and 40 years ago show that he has operated extensively in New York, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Ohio, Illinois, Wisconsin, Texas, Utah, Kansas, California, West Virginia, Georgia and Washington. He appears to have been born in New York state, in 1847 or 1848, his real name being Samuel Oakley Crawford. He enlisted in the Union army in 1864, reappeared after the war was over as a temperance lecturer, studied law for a short while, but in 1867 professed religion and preached as a Methodist minister in New Jersey. In 1868 he married his first wife, one Josephine Ericson Moore. The following year he deserted his wife and infant daughter, and shortly after turned up in Albany. There he obtained a large sum of money from an ignorant farmer, was arrested and in 1870 was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary. When he was released he was fairly launched on his career of crime.
 In 1874 he married (No. 2) in Chicago, the daughter of a Boston clairvoyant, whom he speedily deserted, for later in the same year he was in Ohio getting married to No. 3, who was the daughter of a well-known judge, whose name he forged to a note for \$3000. Kansas City afforded him, now as "Eugene Bonner," a brief refuge from these complications early in 1876, but he left his shelter with a reward of \$50 offered for his capture. A brief period of law work in Peoria, under the patronage of a leading light of a Christian Association, was interrupted by the expostulations of wife No. 2, which ended in his flight to San Francisco. Here marriage

with a wealthy widow, of whom he had borrowed a trifle of \$2,000, was dramatically frustrated by the receipt of a telegram as the ceremony was beginning, and the baffled but persevering bridegroom sought a more congenial sphere in Salt Lake City, where he became a Mormon, is said to have preached in the Temple, and got away to Texas in 1875, with great expedition and the best part of \$5000 lent by the confiding followers of Brigham Young.
 In 1878, the apostle of truth had found it well to remove to Detroit, where he joined a traveling company of actors. In this city, again, in the same year, he married No. 4 a Miss Emma Huntton, under the name of "Bannerton." Abandoning the stage he settled in New Lisbon, Wisconsin, where he practiced as a lawyer for some time, gaining great confidence in the place, but borrowing money and forging a number of bonds and checks. When an indictment for forgery was found against him, his partner stood bail for him, and the prophet escaped, leaving wife No. 4.
 During 1882 and 1883, the records show that "Worthington" traveled the Northwest as an English tourist, visiting many towns on the Northern Pacific railway, and cashing drafts for unknown amounts, which proved worthless. In 1883 he went to Boston, where he entered into partnership with a lawyer, and lived in great style. Here he made the acquaintance of a Mrs. John P. Sargent, a married woman, with a leaning to spiritualism, and the control of some money. Having met her at a seance the prophet developed great assiduity in spiritualistic studies, and in February, 1885, he induced the woman to fly with him to West Virginia, leaving her husband, but not her money, behind. The pair resided in Charleston, where a Mr. Dana was victimized to the tune of \$3,000. About 1886 the man disappeared altogether, and the police authorities of the leading cities in this country where he was well, but not favorably known had supposed him dead until word was received this week from Melbourne showing that he was at his old tricks in that far off land.

INJUSTICE OF JUSTICE.

George Pullion Torn From Bosom of His Family by Hands of Law—Was Innocent.
 A peculiar story of the injustice of justice has just come to light in Walla Walla, says the Union. It concerns a father and mother and a family of the unusual number of thirteen children, a deputy United States marshal and the federal courts of Indian territory.
 Six months ago George Pullion and his family came to Walla Walla from the southwest territory. The father took up a homestead in the new Franklin county country, but was obliged to reside in Walla Walla that he might support his wife and children.
 Little was known of the Pullions and they were given no more than passing notice by the neighbors. Suddenly a strange man appeared in Walla Walla and went to the Pullion home. Then he and Pullion departed and there was sorrow in the household.
 This was about two months ago and it developed that the stranger was a deputy United States marshal, and Pullion was charged with the crime of embezzlement by the federal courts of Indian territory.
 Letters to his children were not encouraging. "If I'm convicted," he said, "I must go to prison and if that is the case I'll never return."
 The Pullions, robbed of their chief support, were visited by a second misfortune. The two youngest children were twins, a boy and a girl, a year old. Last week the little boy died.
 Yesterday the gloom of the Pullions was turned to joy, when the father suddenly returned. He had been acquitted of the charge.
