

NO WHEAT SALES FOR OVER TWO WEEKS.

Farmers Holding Their Wheat Until it Again Sells at 60 Cents a Bushel. Wheat remains at 59 cents a bushel-or at least it was quoted at that figure last week. No quotations have

been given out for Pendleton dealers since Friday of last week and this is ample evidence that exporters are not in the market for this cereal.

Although it was thought that everybody holding wheat would dispose of it as soon as possible after it reached the 60-cent mark, there has been less sold since it reached that figure

than was sold earlier in the year at 50 and 52 cents. Farmers have refused to sell at 60 cents hoping to receive not less than 63 or 64 and after it dropped a cent on the bushel none would sell which has been the cause of small sales for two weeks.

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
