SIGN AGREEMENT

TROUBLE BETWEEN TRIBUNE AND PRINTERS ENDED.

An Agreement Entered into by the Morning Paper and Typographical Union No. 214.

The misunderstanding between Typographical Union No. 214, and the morning paper has been amicably settled. G. H. Howell, district organizer, came up from Portland yesterday, and through his efforts the trouble was settled at a meeting of the union men and the proprietors of the Tribune in the afternoon. All the old men have been put back to work except the foreman, who was dismissed by the Tribune management for cause. The following contract was signed by the parties concerned: "This agreement, made and entered into this 11th day of November, 1902, by and between the Pendleton Tribune, through its authorized representative, the party of the first part, and the subordinate union of the International Typographical Union of the city of Pendleton, known as Typographical Union No. 214, by its committee duly authorized to act in its behalf, party of the second part.

Witnesseth: That from and after November 11, 1902, and for a term of one year, ending November 11, 1903, and for such a reasonable time thereafter (not exceeding 30 days) as may be required for the negotiation of an agreement, the newspaper represented by the said party of the first part binds itself to the employment in its composing room and the departments thereof, of mechanics and workmen who are members of Typographical Union No. 214, and agrees to respect and observe the conditions imposed by the constitution, by-laws and scale of prices of the aforesaid organization, copies of which are hereunto attached and made a part of this agreement.

In witness whereof, we have hereunto set our hands and seals, this 11th day of November, 1902."

FUNERAL TOMORROW.

Remains of Mrs. C. A. Getchell, Who Died at Spokane, Arrive in Pendleton and Will Be Interred Tomorrow.

The remains of Mrs. Della May Getchell, wife of Conductor C. A. Getchell arrived on Tuesday evening's train from Spokane where she died in the Sacred Heart hospital, from the effects of an operation.

Mrs. Getchell is well known in Pendleton where she spent most of her life before marriage. She was born at Walla Walla, February 13, 1875, and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. White, removed to Pendleton when she was a small child. March 13, 1892, she was married to C. A. Getchell, who is now a conductor on the O. R. & N. line between Tekoa and Waller.

She was a granddaughter of D. T. Lenox, captain of the first wagon train to cross the Rocky Mountains, coming Westward. The train was piloted by Dr. Whitman. Her grandfather organized the first Baptist church to be organized on the Pacific Coast.

Mrs. Getchell leaves a husband and two children, Clarence, 7 years of age, and Bonetta, aged 4. She is a sister of Mrs. J. R. Means, Jr., and has a sister, Mrs. W. B. Estes living at Winnatchee, Wash. The funeral which was to have been held in the First Baptist church today, has been postponed until 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon in order to give Mrs. Estes time to arrive here to attend. The remains will be laid to rest in the Olney cemetery.

GENERAL NEWS.

A negro, named Miller, has confessed, through hypnotic influences, to the murder of two persons in Savannah, Ga.

Representative Charles E. Littlefield, of Maine, is making a vigorous campaign for the speakership of the next house of representatives.

The comptroller of the currency has warned the bankers that business is too good and that its volume is too great for our financial capacities.

Roosevelt and Cleveland spoke at the dedication of the new building of the New York Chamber of Commerce, Tuesday. The structure cost \$3,000,000.

In dedicating the New York Chamber of Commerce yesterday, Grover Cleveland said that commerce was curbing man's besetting sins of selfishness and greed.

As a result of the vote in favor of an affiliation of the Chicago Teachers' Federation with the Federation of Labor, the former organization is threatened with disruption.

Governor Dole, of Hawaii, has issued a statement that there is no truth in the assertion that Porto Rican laborers who came to those islands have been ill treated.

President Eliot, of Harvard, at a banquet in Boston Monday night, denounced the labor unions of the country and said that he had a profound contempt for any man who did not choose to labor every day as long as his strength would permit.
