as one of the most substantial business institutions in the place. Geo. L. Lacy, is also an implement dealer and real estate agent.

E. R. Cox's hardware store is another of the old and substantial institutions of the place. He has been in the business in Athena for 18 years and knows the wants of the people.

N. A. Miller runs an up-to-date furniture store and also conducts undertaking parlors. He has been in business here 16 years.

The Pioneer drug store is owned by G. C. Osburn, who has been in business in Athena nine years.

The Palace drug store by McBride & Co., is an eight-year-old Athena business institution. Athena's drug stores are up-to-date as are her other business houses.

R. J. Boddy is the pioneer meat market man, having supplied the people for eight years, and having the field alone.

Charles Gay and C. W. Gates, each run cigar and confectionery stores and have club rooms adjoining their respective places of business where a large number of patrons spend their idle time in pleasant recreation.

The Commercial livery stable is owned by King Bros., and they are doing a prosperous business.

John Wright runs a feed yard. Parker & Keen have been running a barber shop for 13 consecutive years and W. H. Keen has a shop which he has been running three years.

Goodhue, of Beaumont, for the Southwestern district; Mrs. Edmund Key, of Marshall, for the North-eastern district; Miss Cockrell, of Abilene, for the Northwestern district, and Mrs. Milton W. Simms, of Bryan, for the Southwestern district.

Reports of the various federation officers and the election of new members were the principal features of business at the afternoon session. This evening the delegates are to listen to an address by Mrs. D. T. S. Denison, of New York City, president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

The sessions of the convention are to continue until next Friday. The promotion of the educational movement is to be the principal work of the present gathering. The federation hopes to be able to raise an endowment fund for scholarships in the state university for poor but deserving girls. The movement has aroused general interest throughout the state and promises to result successfully.
