NTERESTING CHAT WITH

Crossing the Plains-Pioneer History -Left Wing of Price's Army-List of Early Settlers.

One of the old settlers of the Grande Ronde Valley is J. A. McWhir-ter. "When did I strike this valley?" said Mr. McWhirter. "I saw this valey for the first time in the fall of 1853. We stopped a couple of days at Ladd's Canyon to let our stock rest up and graze on the splendid range here in the valley. The whole valley was one vast expanse of waving grass. Coming down from the mountains as we did, it seemed to us we had never seen such a beautiful valley. I had been working in a harness

shop in Pennsylvania for four years and 1 got the Western fever. "I made the trip from Mercer, Pa., to Portland, Or., for \$60. When I got on the stage at Mercer, Pa., I had just \$100. At Pittsburg I left the stage and went by water to St. Joe. This trip, from Pennsylvania to St. Joe, Mo., took nearly \$60 of my \$100. At St. Joe I fell in with a man who

gave me a job driving one of his wag-gons. He boarded me for my work. We drove from St. Joe to Portland. Or. I left Portland the fall of 1853, and walked to Marysville, or as it is now called, Corvallis, where I got a job in the harness shop of J. B. Congle, who afterwards ran a big shop in Portland. From Marysville I went

to Union Point, in Linn county. "In '54 the Indiana chased me out

work. At one time they employed as many as 300 men to patrol the 15 miles of ditch, but still we would succeed in harassing them. At last they compromised. They gave us \$20,000 for our interest and gave us jobs in UNION COUNTY PIONEER, repairing the ditch. After that they never had any trouble.

"In 1862 I bought in a pack train to Auburn. I sold my pack outfit and took up 240 acres of land one mile east of the present city of La Grande. I have been in the harness business almost continuously since that time, though 1 do not take an active part in harness making nowadays When I first came here in 1862, the feeling engendered by the war then raging was very bitter.

"A big tide of immigration came in the fall of '62. They were almost entirely Southern sympathizers. We called them the left wing of Price's But no actual trouble occurarmy. red.

"Yes, there are a good many oldtimers here yet. I guess the assessor of this county. Ben Brown, is one of the oldest pioneers. Then there are General J. H. Stevens, Colonel Curry, George Wells, W. R.
