#### Destoyed by Fire.

The entire town was destroyed by fire in 1883, save one building which still stands and is now occupied by the Fair store. The town soon began to rebuild and has continued in a general substantial growth until the recent building spirit which has struck it and brought it into notice throughour the immediate country. ber of new resident buildings have just been completed and a number of others are under construction. Several new business blocks are also contemplated.

The second act of the legislature incorporating and enlarging the rights of the municipality was passed 1893. Following are the present town officials: J. A. Best, mayor: M. Bryson, M. A. Baker, J. #### In Good Condition,

The town is in good financial condition. It owns its own water system and fire department and has a good city hall and jail and owns the grounds upon which they are situated. The water works are especially etficient. The reservoir is fed by a large group of springs owned by the town and the elevation of the reservoir is such that water can be thrown through the ordinary fire hose a distance of 20 feet in the air, many above the highest building or church steeple in the town. In connection with the department is also a volunteer hook and ladder company and this and the hose company are kept so thoroughly organized that the peo ple of Weston do not fear another destruction by fire.

#### Schools.

The schools of Weston are her spe cial features. The Eastern Oregon Normal School has long had a reputation for its thoroughness, and now under the management of Professor Martindale the equipment is said to have about reached perfection.
