KANSAS WAR STORY

NAKED AMERICAN TROOPS CAPTURE NATIVE VILLAGE.

Col. Funston's Regiment Goes in Swimming and is Taken on Sur-prise.

"A Kansas regiment under Col. Funston was pursuing the Filipino army one day in July," said a returned volunteer to the East Oregonian representative, "when the Bagdad river, near Maloios was reached. The insurgents had outrun us and were all out of sight. Our outposts were in advance of the regiment and the boys thought the fight was over for the day. There had been some skirmishing going on and occasional shots rang out from the bamboo jungles to right and left. This firing had now all ceased and not a sound was heard on that oppressive after-noon, except the distant piping of some water fowl and the jests of the rollicking Kansas troopers.

Go in Swimming.

"Upon permission from our captain, (Acting Major) Watson, about 40 of us undressed and went in swimming. The water was refreshing, after our long march and we were enjoying it hugely. The main body of the regiment was down the river nearly a half mile from the swimming hole. The pickets had returned and joined us. Everything seemed so quiet and peaceful that we relaxed our guard, even in the country of the enemy.

Shots From the Bush.

Our clothing was stacked up on the bank, our guns and cartridge belts were lying near and we were diving and splashing the water in forgetfulness of our business, when a sudden fusillade of shots from the jungle poured out upon us.

"Grab your guns and belts," shouted the captain, "don't stop to dress," and we scrambled out of the water into the thicket with nothing but our hats on. A few natives were in sight when we reached the open a few hundred yards distant, and we gave chase. Never did Filipino nor Kansan run so hard before or since. We chased them into a native village, routed the few soldiers guarding it and took possession. The village only consisted of some 20 bamboo huts, but we threw a skirmish line around it and began to patrol the street to keep
