## TO FOUND A HOME

**JOSEPH STUBBLEFIELD'S INTERESTING STATEMENT.**

Home for Orphan Children to Be Located at Walla Walla or Some Other Point to Be Selected.

Joseph I. Stubblefield, an old and respected citizen of this and Walla Walla counties, who died at his home near Walla Walla last week, left a will by which an orphan's home is to be built with his vast estate, at some city accepting the conditions of his testament. Mr. Stubblefield was a member of the board of commissioners for Umatilla county 22 years ago, during the incumbency of County Judge Yoakum. He was an intimate friend of the prominent citizens and business men of this county and the philanthropic disposal of his enormous wealth is intensely interesting to residents of this city and county.

The will of Mr. Stubblefield, so far as it relates to the building of the orphan asylum is as follows:

"I hereby bequeath all the real and residue of my estate, real, personal and mixed, of whatsoever kind and wheresoever situated, in trust to be devoted to, invested and the income thereof to be expended by said trustees and their successors, for the establishment, maintenance and support of a home for fatherless and motherless and indigent children, residents of the states of Washington and Oregon and to their maintenance and to the giving of a common school education and the teaching of some useful trade to the children inmates thereof.

"It is my wish that said home be located at or near Walla Walla, provided that within one year after the probate of my will there be donated to said trustees and their successors, the sum of \$10,000 or its equivalent in value for the purpose of acquiring ground and the erection of suitable buildings for such home.

"In case the sum is not donated, then some other suitable town either in Washington or Oregon to be selected."

R. M. Dorothy and E. A. Reser, of Umatilla county and C. M. Rader, of Walla Walla county are executors.

### P. H. S. AND INDIANS.

Will Play Football Tomorrow Afternoon.

The fans are jubilant over this game. They expect it to be a contest of strength on one side and skill on the other. For this reason and the fact that good weather is prevailing, a large crowd is expected out to the local grounds to witness the game.

While this game is not creating as much interest as the game scheduled for Thanksgiving with the Baker City team, it will be one worth seeing. It will also give the boys an idea of their strength which they have not had so far this season.

## ANOTHER PIONEER

**WILLIAM P. STURGIS DIES AT WALLA WALLA.**

Once a Resident of Umatilla County—Father of Sam P. Sturgis, Now Deceased, of Pendleton, National Bank.

Word was received here this morning announcing the death of William P. Sturgis, an old and respected citizen of Walla Walla, which occurred this morning at his home in that city.

Mr. Sturgis was 81 years of age. He came West from the state of Maine in 1871, and was for a time a respected resident of Umatilla county, living on the Wild Horse, below Athena. He was the father of Sam P. Sturgis, cashier of the First National Bank here, who died a few years ago.

Mr. Sturgis was one of the most estimable citizens of this and Walla Walla counties and his many pioneer friends here will regret to hear of his death.

He leaves an aged wife, who is suffering from a severe stroke of paralysis and is not expected to survive her husband many days. The funeral will be held Saturday at his home, in Walla Walla, and the remains will be interred at that place.

## NEW CORPORATION

**KNOWN AS THE PENDLETON SEED SEPARATOR COMPANY**

Local Company Formed to Manufacture a Fanning Mill—Have Placed an Order for Fifty.

Articles of incorporation for a new business firm were filed with the county clerk Thursday afternoon. The new company is called the Pendleton Seed Separator Company and is incorporated with \$5000 stock. The incorporators are W. H. Fowler, C. E. Bean and N. Berkley, and the other members of the company are Frank Cutt, Thomas Thompson, C. C. Sharp, Mr. Alloway, James R. Welch and A. L. Doble.

The object of the formation of this corporation is to place on the market a new kind of fanning mill for cleaning wheat and other seeds. The company contemplates manufacturing the machines here and have already placed an order with Halseore & Howe for the manufacture of 50 of the Mills. It is claimed for their mill that it is much superior to anything ever before placed on the market. The cost of the machine is almost one-half less than the regular machines now being sold for cleaning wheat, and as they have been proven to be equal with any of them in quality, they will no doubt meet with success. The incorporators are all local men except Mr. Doble, who came here recently from Michigan. They have purchased the right to Oregon, Washington and Idaho, and will place the machines on the market at once. They have the patents under which they are protected.
