

AGAIN POSTPONED

NAMES OF CARRIERS NOT YET ANNOUNCED.

Examinations Made in October, But Postmaster Has Not Been Advised as to Appointments.

Postmaster Lot Livermore has not yet received notice of the appointment of the carriers on the Pendleton free delivery route. The date of the commencement of free delivery was fixed, some time ago, for December 1, but as it will be necessary for carriers to spend several days in familiarizing themselves with the routes, it will be impossible for the plan to be inaugurated by that date, even though the carriers were named now.

The examination papers of the applicants for the position of carriers, were sent to the postoffice department in October, and the unusual delay in making the appointments will cause much disappointment to residents of Pendleton, who have long anticipated the benefits of this change. It is quite likely another month will now elapse before the beginning of the new system. However, all preparations are complete, so far as the Pendleton office is concerned, and free delivery will be in operation very soon after the appointment of carriers is announced. No information has been furnished Mr. Livermore as to the cause of the delay, although the postoffice department has been wired that everything is in readiness at this office.

MESSENGER SERVICE.

Call Boxes to be Put in Places of Business and Messengers Employed.

Pendleton is to have the A. D. T. delivery service installed and in full working order within the next few weeks. Some of the instruments have arrived for the local Western Union office and the last installment of instruments and paraphernalia is expected at once.

The placing of the boxes will be completed soon and then the services of from six to ten messenger boys will be required to handle the work on the outside. Call boxes will be placed in all the prominent business houses and places where the services of a messenger boy is likely to be needed at any time. These boxes are put in and maintained at no expense to the customer as the company place the instruments, wires and call boxes at their own expense. All that is required of the patrons is for them to give the company their business. Not only will messages be delivered to any part of the city for a small sum, but business men having packages to deliver can have them delivered without delay.

Pasco Editor Takes Position With Yakima Paper.

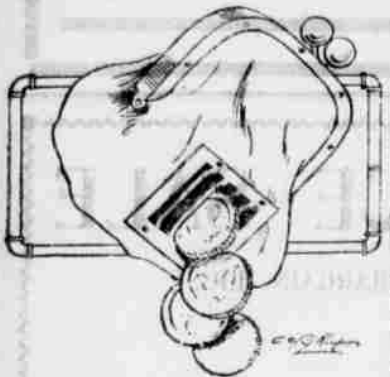

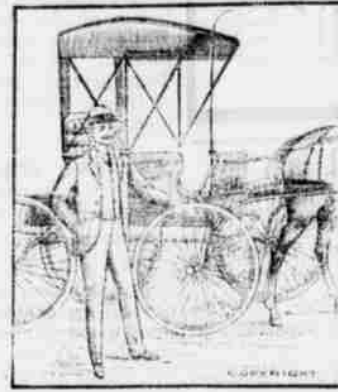
