A FIRE EDITION

STORY FROM OREGON
NEWSPAPER HISTORY.

The Death of Editor McGarrey, of
Lakeview, recalls an interesting
incident in Oregon Journalism.
The death of J. E. McGarrey, editor
of the Lake County Examiner, last
week, recalls one of the most interest-
ing little incidents that has ever
brightened the field of Oregon jour-
nalism. At the time of the fire in
Lakeview, in June, 1900, McGarrey
was editor of the Examiner and J.
C. Oliver was editor of the Lake
County Rustler. The two papers
were bitter opponents and delighted
to take opposite sides of every ques-
tion. It was a continual "scrap" in
Lakeview and the people became di-
vided, more or less, on local issues,
cut of preference for their favorite
paper.

"Barriers Burned Away."
Finally the Lakeview fire of 1900
wiped out the town, newspaper shops
and all. One paper saved a few cases
of type and one saved an old job
press. In the midst of the sad spec-
tacle of the devastated town and the
vanished fortunes of many citizens,
some wag termed the destruction of
the rival offices, "barriers burned
away." It was hoped that old bit-
terness had been consumed with
the office fixtures and that a more
congenial spirit would revive in the
work of rebuilding the town and
uniting local interests.

The morning following the fire, the
editors of the Rustler and the Ex-
aminer met in a butcher shop that
had been saved from destruction.
(It would not be fair to jest now
about the incongruous idea of "word
butchers" sheltering under the roof
of real butchers.) They compared
notes and took stock and after shak-
ing hands they began to set a few
lines of type for a fire edition. For
the headlines letters from different
fonts were used. There was not a
complete case of type left, but the
unhappily mechanical make-up did
not detract from the spirit that actuated
the work. It was the happiest
day that had visited Lakeview jour-
nalism for many a bitter month. The
people appreciated the public spir-
ited task of the editors and gave them
heartly encouragement. The result,
indeed, was "barriers burned away."

Brown, in this county. The crime was
a most brutal one. On the night of
September 27, Elliot entered the home
of Caleb Brown, felled him with a
stick and assaulted his wife. He was
tried at a special term of court, or-
dered by Governor Aycock, and speed-
ily found guilty.

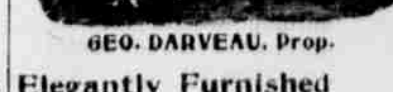
