HAVE STRONG TEAM

ACADEMY PLAYERS AFTER TOMORROW'S CHAMPIONS.

With Four More Experienced Men, the Academy Promises to Take the Honors of Eastern Oregon.

The Academy football team has challenged the winning team in the Pendleton and Baker City game here tomorrow afternoon to play them a game on the afternoon of Dec. 6.

The Academy team has been strengthened wonderfully recently by the addition of three or four good men who have played for years and are husky fellows. Two of them are from the reservation and have played with the Chinawa school, while Lester Lewis and Berkeley Halley, two old players, may line up with the Academy team.

This will make the Academy team a very formidable foe. They say they are determined and will play the winning team of the two rival teams for the championship of Eastern Oregon for all there is in it and they expect to win.

The game here tomorrow is for the championship which Baker City now holds and if Pendleton wrests it from the visitors the Academy team says it will surely win it from the home boys when they meet on the local gridiron. If Baker City again carries off the honors they are willing to play the victors on their own grounds or in this city as the case may be determined after the game. Joseph Kennedy, captain of the academy team, is anxious to play the winners. If Baker takes away the honors he says the Academy will bring them back as it is settled between the players on his team that they must and will bring the championship to Pendleton this year.

Goldendale Game Called Off.

The game between the Pendleton Academy team and the Goldendale team has been called off. The local team was to have left tonight for that place, but a telegram was received this morning saying for the boys not to come. This is a great disappointment to the Academy team, as it expected the Thanksgiving game to fit them for the fray with the winning team in the Baker-Pendleton high school game here tomorrow.

Tomorrow's Game.

Considerable interest is being manifested in the championship game here beginning at 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon between the Pendleton high school and the Baker City high school teams.

The Baker team arrived this morning so as to get a good rest before going into the fray as they are looking for a hard battle. The Baker team has won all the games it has played so far this season, and won from the Weston Normal team and from the La Grande high school with just about the same score that Pendleton won from the same teams. This shows that the Baker and Pendleton teams are very evenly matched and one of the greatest games of the season is looked for.

Strong Teams.

The high school team is the strongest it has ever been while the Baker City team is very little, if any, stronger than last year. The locals have had some very valuable practice, top, especially with the Indians Saturday, which did much to perfect the defense of the team. The boys are all in pretty good shape except Milarkey, who strained his back slightly in the Saturday's game. If he does not feel able to go into the game Hawks will take his place at right end.

BEGINS INVESTIGATION.

Concerning the Workings of the Carey Act in Oregon.

In spite of the fact that the convention glossed over the rights of private companies for the sake of harmony, there is likely to be a shaking up of the dry bones among those who seem to have too liberally interpreted the meaning of the Carey act. The government has already begun an investigation which, so state those on the inside show either woeful carelessness and blindness on the part of state officials or an intent to pandor to the greed of private corporate interests, says the Telegram. Its inspector, whose honesty is not doubted, claims that not only did a company owning state contract along the Deschutes try to bribe him, but that another company was claiming land to be arid which is not arid land within the meaning of the Carey act. The agitation over irrigation due to the formation of the Oregon Irrigation Association, has brought out some of these facts and will bring out many more important ones unless the government officials are called off.

Contest Declared Off.

The declamatory contest, which was to have been held tomorrow evening at the public school building, between the Baker City and Pendleton high schools, has been called off. The reason given is that Baker City school is not ready to enter the contest now and wished to have it postponed for a while.
