The markets abroad do not warrant paying over \$1.40 per cental, but higher prices were paid recently to secure the grain. The demand from Australia has revived. and buyers are endeavoring to secure wheat in the State of California or from its northern neighbors. About 150,000 bushels of wheat were receiv ed here the past few weeks, and there is more to follow. 
