OREGON APPLES PAY

WELL-KNOWN FRUITGROWER GIVES SOME FIGURES.

Codlin Moth in Forest Trees Threatens to Become an Alarming Peril to Orchards—Fruit Men Cannot Spray Entire Mountain.

The winter apple has come to the front in Southern Oregon as a revenue producer, according to Frank Williams, a well-known orchardist of Ashland. "This year's crop of winter apples has made good money for all the orchardists of Rogue river valley," he said, "and now that its value has become known, more apple trees are planted every year."

"A fair quality of apples brings \$1 a box in the orchard, and at this rate the business is quite profitable. When I was in the East we used to think \$1 a barrel was a big price for apples, and fruitraisers who obtained that figure soon grew rich. Yet a barrel of apples would equal to about three boxes, for which the Southern Oregon producer gets \$1 each."

Increased Values.

"Orchards in our vicinity have enhanced rapidly in value within the past five years, and I know of one containing 160 acres of trees that could have been bought in 1897 for \$15,000, but now \$50,000 would not be accepted for it, as fully \$15,000 worth of apples have been sold from it this year."

"The winter apple is an easy fruit to harvest, as the producer has all winter to ship his fruit in. Most of the better grades of apples have already been picked and are in the bins, to be shipped at leisure, but a large proportion of the inferior quality are still on the trees."

Codlin Moth in Forests.

"The codlin moth is becoming quite a nuisance among the apple trees down our way, and spraying must be resorted to several times a year if the fruitgrowers desire to keep the pest down. Not only are the fruit trees beset with these insects, but the pests are also found on the trees of the forest, where they seem to live and multiply when driven from the orchards. The codlin moth nuisance thus grows greater every year, and I don't know what the fruit men will do when the forests become generally infested, as we cannot expect the apple men to spray the whole country. I think that some insect will be found which will prey on the codlin moth, as that pest has preyed on the apples, and when that insect has appeared the moth will be exterminated. In California they are trying to introduce the lady bug, and this is successful to some extent, but I have not much faith in its ability to ex-

terminate the apple pest. In the meantime we must wage unceasing war on the codlin moth with the best means we have, which is the spray pump loaded with lime and sulphur."
