## CONCERNING FISH

THE MASTER FISH WARDEN  
 REPORTS TO COMMISSIONERS.

Financial Statement Shows That \$11-  
 486.25 Was Expended—Suggests  
 Revision of Licenses—Discusses  
 Dams and Irrigation Ditches.

Salem, Ore., Dec. 12.—Master Fish  
 Warden H. G. Van Dusen's annual re-  
 port to the state board of fish com-  
 missioners is a model of neatness  
 and good business form. It consists  
 of more than 100 full typewritten  
 sheets, and makes a very complete  
 showing of all operations in the de-  
 partment of fisheries for the year  
 1902. The financial statement shows  
 that \$11,486.25 was expended from  
 the hatchery fund in the year, leaving  
 a balance of \$16,996.44. It is estimat-  
 ed, however, that work in hand De-  
 cember 1 would reduce the balance  
 by \$8872. Balances in special hatch-  
 ery funds aggregate \$8308.63. Of the  
 legislative appropriation of \$9200 for  
 salaries and expenses of the Master  
 Warden and deputy, an unexpended  
 balance of \$1746.15 was reported for  
 December 1.

**Three Cents a Case.**  
 The master warden suggests a re-  
 vision of the schedule of legal li-  
 censes so as to raise more money  
 from the packers, requiring of them  
 about three cents for each case of  
 salmon put up, and also a readjust-  
 ment of the licenses paid by dealers,  
 putting them in 21 grades with li-  
 censes ranging from \$10 to \$700, the  
 higher figure being for the dealer who  
 handles up to 1000 tons.

It is recommended that the law pro-  
 tecting black bass be repealed. But  
 the legislature is cautioned against  
 yielding to the pressure for repeal-  
 ing the present law for the protection  
 of the sturgeon of the Columbia river.

**Dams and Irrigating Ditches.**  
 Regarding the injury which dams  
 and irrigating works bring to the busi-  
 ness of propagating salmon, the re-  
 port says:

"The matter of harnessing the  
 waters of our different rivers by the  
 immense dams that are being built  
 across them for power and milling  
 purposes is sure to jeopardize fish-  
 ing industry of this state, for, as a  
 general thing, they are building  
 across the most desirable salmon-  
 breeding streams that we have and  
 across streams on which we already  
 have salmon-hatching plants located  
 that have cost state and private in-  
 dividuals thousands of dollars, and  
 upon the protection and maintenance  
 of which one of the most important of  
 her industries depends.

"Irrigating ditches are becoming  
 so numerous and so extensive all over  
 our state that they will soon be the  
 most serious affairs that the salmon  
 and other anadromous species of fish  
 will have to contend with if proper  
 laws and regulations are not provid-  
 ed governing and defining absolutely  
 under what conditions our people  
 may be privileged to take the waters  
 from the streams for such purposes.

"As it is now, no consideration or  
 regard is given the matter by the  
 ditchman; he is simply privileged to  
 tap the stream as he pleases and take  
 the water from it without regard to  
 any other interest. This should not  
 be, and proper regulations and re-  
 strictions should immediately be  
 placed on the matter, and if the water  
 so much needed to foster the young  
 salmon, one of the greatest food pro-  
 ducts this state has ever known, is to  
 be taken by the ditchman for agricul-  
 tural purposes, he should be willing  
 to comply with wise regulations and  
 restrictions, whatever they may be.  
 In this respect it is not necessary  
 to impose unnecessary embarrass-  
 ments or restrictions upon the matter  
 but proper protective regulations and  
 restrictions should be required."

**General Recommendations.**  
 That the state be divided into two  
 districts, with all of the coast streams  
 in one district and the Columbia  
 River in the other district.  
 Repeat the individual fisherman's  
 license.  
 Allow no fishing on hatchery  
 streams or no salmon-spawning  
 streams, excepting with hook and  
 line, commonly called angling.  
 That on streams across which is  
 constructed and maintained a dam,  
 no fishing be allowed, excepting with  
 hook and line, commonly called angling,  
 and that hook and line fishing be  
 restricted, and not allowed within  
 half a mile of the dam.  
 That a well regulated and substan-  
 tial system of head works and gates  
 be required at the intake of every  
 irrigation ditch and mining ditch.  
 That a "dynamiter" be punished  
 with a term of years in the peniten-  
 tary, and not be allowed to get off  
 with a fine as under the present law.  
 That the board of fish commis-  
 sioners be authorized and empowered to  
 offer a reward to be paid out of the  
 hatchery fund, for the arrest and con-  
 viction of a dynamiter, or for the ar-  
 rest and conviction of a person pollut-  
 ing the waters of the state with ma-  
 licious intent.  
 The sheriffs and constables and all  
 peace officers be required to see to it  
 that the state laws and all county  
 and municipal ordinances for the pro-  
 tection of the fish are enforced.  
 That fishing appliances found fish-  
 ing unlawfully and in prohibited  
 waters, be seized and destroyed by  
 any fish commissioner, fish warden,  
 deputy warden, water bailiff, sheriff,  
 deputy sheriff, constable, or any  
 special officer.  
 That the state assist the work of  
 artificial propagation of salmon and  
 provide the hatchery establishments.  
 That the law protecting black bass  
 be repealed.  
 That the law protecting black bass  
 commonly known as the "scalp act,"  
 be repealed.  
 That the circuit and justice courts  
 be given co-ordinate jurisdiction of  
 all offenses against the fish laws.
