APPEAL FOR BOERS

SOUTH AFRICAN MINISTER SPEAKS IN PENDLETON.

Native Boer Missionary Touring the Coast—Was Chaplain in Botha's Army—Now Seeking Aid for Destitute Widows and Orphans of the Transvaal.

Rev. Serg. Sonson, a Boer minister, sent by his countrymen as one of the large number of missionaries to arouse the churches of the United States in behalf of the widows and orphans of South Africa, spent Sunday and Monday in this city.

Rev. Sonson did not announce his coming in advance, and very few people knew of his presence in the city. He addressed the congregation at the Congregational church last night at the conclusion of Rev. Edward's sermon.

In broken English he painted the condition of his countrymen and native land before the opening of the Boer war. Peace and plenty reigned everywhere. The God-fearing people, temperate, virtuous and religious, were contented, thrifty and happy.

The war swept like a blighting wind across the land and it now lies barren and wasted. Villages are destroyed, homes burned down, those of the leaders who were not killed are in British penal stations at St. Helena, and elsewhere. Orphan children are quartered with relatives, whose means are exhausted on account of the destroyed industries.

Rev. Sonson was born and has been reared in the Pietermaritzburg district of the Transvaal, 90 miles north of Pretoria. He was educated at Johannesburg and is working under the London Congregational Society.

He was a chaplain in the armies under Generals Botha, Cronje and Delaroy. He was in the battles of Colenso, Koijie, Modder River and the Tugela.

He says he has seen the Kafirs eat grass, to keep from starving, so complete was the devastation of their country by the British. It was with great difficulty that he succeeded in getting away from South Africa on his present mission, as the English watched the ports so closely.

He embarked at Zanzibar, Portuguese Africa, came to Singapore, India, thence to Yokohama, Japan, and thence to Victoria, B. C.

At Singapore he experienced a typhoon, which almost wrecked the vessel. They were delayed for days on account of bad weather.

His description of the faraway country, told so simply, yet so graphically, brings the Boer war a step nearer to America than by the bare press dispatches.

He will sail for Singapore from Victoria in a few days, on his return to Africa. He has been warmly welcomed at every point in the United States and goes home pleased with the result of his mission.

As an illustration of the extent of the education of the native Boer ministers and missionaries, it is worthy of note that Rev. Sonson speaks six languages—Dutch, French, Portuguese, Kafir, Buchema and English.

PREPARING FOR CHRISTMAS.

Expensive Articles Have Been Ordered—First Lot of Trees Reaches Walla Walla.

Walla Walla, Dec. 15.—Preparations for the holiday season are being made rapidly, and all the stores bear ample evidence of the coming visit of Santa Claus. An unusually large display of holiday goods is shown in all the stores, and the general character is better than in previous years. More expensive articles have been ordered, and they are being generally bought, so merchants report.

The first lot of Christmas trees has been brought in from the Blue Mountains, to be used for decorative purposes. Each Christmas calls for scores of pretty trees, and they are secured by mountaineers who sell them as ordered at fairly remunerative prices. The regular trees for use at Christmas time are brought in a day or two before the holiday. A large shipment of holly and mistletoe has been received and divided amongst the merchants who make a specialty of holiday goods.

OREGON TAKES FIRST PRIZE.

Morrow County Bull Leads the Exhibits at Livestock Exposition.

A telegram from W. O. Minor from Chicago says: "Rolando, the Oregon one-year-old, Shorthorn bull, took first prize and topped the sales at the International Livestock Exposition here today."

This is not only a victory for Mr. Minor, but for Morrow county and Oregon as well. It demonstrates the fact that Eastern Oregon is especially adapted to stockraising. The winning of this prize is one that Mr. Minor, Hoppper and Morrow county may well feel proud, as it at once placed the Mountain Valley stock farm among the foremost of the nation. It will tend to stimulate the breeding of fine stock in Eastern Oregon. Much has already been done along these lines in this section by Mr. Minor and others, but this last victory, won in a contest against stock from all over the world, places Oregon right up in the front row as a livestock producer.—Heppner Times.

GENERAL NEWS.

Spain has offered to purchase two new warships and one cruiser from Chile.

The heaviest snow storm of the season occurred Saturday in Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa and the Dakotas.

The sheriff of Teller county, Colorado, made a haul of \$2500 worth of confiscated gambling tools Friday night.

President Roosevelt Friday was presented with a card of honorary membership in the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen.

A Rock Island train ran into a broken rail near Ferrill, Texas, Friday and was badly wrecked. The engineer and fireman were killed.

A private bank at Hillaboro, New Mexico, was held up in broad daylight Wednesday. The robbers took \$30,000 and fled to the mountains.

An automobile train service is to be inaugurated in France. Each car will carry 40 passengers and will maintain a speed of 62 miles an hour.

Secretary Hitchcock has ordered the suspension of action in the general land office on timber land entries in Oregon, Washington and California. He has also ordered an investigation of timber entries in Oregon.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Mrs. Mary Parham, one of the oldest pioneers of Southern Oregon, died at Ashland on Sunday, at the age of 91. She had resided continuously in that city for 30 years.

Private Ernest Thompson, of Fort Stevens, has been found guilty of arson by the court-martial and sentenced to 20 years in prison. He will be placed in the Leavenworth, Kan., penitentiary.

Three men were arrested Sunday evening at Ashland on suspicion of being the highwaymen who held up the Grant's Pass-Williams stage on Saturday. The men are Frank Miller, of Spokane, George Moody and William Kirkman.

The body of a miner named Ryan, of Butte, Mont., was found Sunday in an outbuilding of Salt Lake City. It is thought he is a victim of "knock out" drops, administered in a drink of liquor at a saloon near by, as \$50 he is known to have had, is missing.

Ingram, the guard of the Oregon penitentiary, who was shot by convict Merrill last summer, is circulating a petition to present to the legislature, asking for a small donation to assist him in starting a small business. The petition is being generally signed.
