AN ABLE SERMON

REV. KING ANSWERS RABBI WISE'S LECTURE.

Takes Up the Question of Christ's Divinity From the Catholic Side—Spoke Highly of the Lecture by Dr. Wise.

The Baptist church was packed with people Sunday evening to hear Rev. R. W. King speak in answer to some of the points brought out by Dr. Stephen S. Wise, the noted Rabbi of Portland, who delivered a lecture on "Israel's Gifts to the World," in the same church last week.

Rev. King began his remarks by paying Dr. Wise the very highest compliments as a gentleman and able speaker. He did not attempt to antagonize Dr. Wise but only pointed out to his hearers that there were two sides to the question upon which Dr. Wise spoke. Dr. Wise said things which have caused considerable comment among the people and it was these questions which Rev. King attempted to answer.

One of the points he touched upon last night was the contention of the noted rabbi that the Jews were not responsible for the crucifixion of Christ. Rev. King agreed with him in some respect as he stated that it was the sin of the human heart that was responsible for the crucifixion. Also that the Roman government was in a measure responsible as it was through the weakness of Pontius Pilate, the head of the Roman government, that Christ was slain, as he could have released him, but the crucifixion should rest on the shoulders of the Jews.

Rev. King quoted scripture to prove this contention. He noted as the highest authority on Jewish history, where he said that it was upon "demand of my people before Pontius Pilate, that Christ was delivered into the hands of the principal people of my nation to be crucified." "This statement," said Rev. King, "contradicts the statement of Dr. Wise that it was the lower classes that crucified Christ, our Savior."

Dr. Wise, in his lecture, said that Christ was one of the greatest, best and wisest men of his day, but he held that there was nothing divine about him. Rev. King said that upon this statement alone was proven the divinity of Christ. It was contended by the rabbi that the statements of the Bible where Christ said that he was the son of God had been inserted by the writers, but Rev. King said that had this been the case the fact would have been discovered long ago as the world was full of noted writers who held opposite views to those of the Bible writers at the time it was being written.

"Rousseau, the noted infidel and many of his followers, said if the gospels were only written by the authority of men and not by divine inspiration then these men were greater than the hero of whom they wrote," said Dr. King.

Many other very interesting points were brought out by Rev. King, but the above were the principal ones and space forbids further comment. The speech was a masterpiece and those present were highly pleased.

An Excellent Lecture.

"Industrial Evolution" was the theme of an excellent and entertaining lecture last night at the Baker City theater by Eugene V. Debs. In the main Mr. Debs spoke to empty benches last night. This would not have occurred in Baker City to a man of Mr. Debs' reputation and ability had the public known he was to lecture. This the public did not know. Whoever had charge of the advertising, if any one did, was imbued with the fallacy that store window advertising was the thing and there was not a line in the newspapers to announce his presence. It did not work and hundreds of people were deprived of the pleasure of hearing a graceful and forceful speaker talk on matters of vital importance.—Baker City Democrat.

GENERAL NEWS.

South and Central Americans on the isthmus are much disappointed with the Roosevelt-Hay interpretation of the Monroe doctrine, which they compare with the Cleveland policy of 1896.

Extensive storms of wind, snow, sleet and rain prevailed Monday throughout the middle West. The telegraph and telephone poles were down and railroads experienced delays in washouts and unsafe tracks.

Five hundred and five divorces were granted in Los Angeles in 1902. Twenty-two hundred and two marriage licenses were granted. In 90 per cent of the divorce cases, women were the plaintiffs. Desertion and failure to provide were the dominating causes.

Walter Hill, the son of President J. J. Hill, was suspended from work in the auditing department of the Great Northern Monday. He did not attend to business. The auditor suspended him pursuant to instructions from his father, who said he wanted the boys treated the same as the other employes.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

S. S. Bateman, a pioneer of Washington county, died at Forest Grove Monday, aged 59.

William McCrum, a well-known pioneer citizen of The Dalles, died Monday evening after a brief illness.

The new courthouse, presented to Malheur county by the citizens of Vale, will be dedicated on Christmas day.

Harry Krester, aged 16, of Corvallis, Or., was accidentally shot while hunting Monday. He died within a few hours afterwards.

Reports from Wasco county to The Dalles, say that considerable stock in some of the interior points has perished in the recent snow storms.

Senator F. J. Keisel, of Utah, is arranging to place 100 German families on the large farms of Malheur county near Ontario, in the near future.

The Falls City railroad from Dalles to Falls City, is now complete, the switches uniting it with the Southern Pacific having been placed in position Monday.

Banker J. H. Albert, of Salem, has decided to pay the face value of certificates of deposit issued by a defunct savings bank scheme, which failed with \$900 in its funds belonging to the school children of Salem. He will repay the children the entire fund in the savings bank at the time of its suspension.

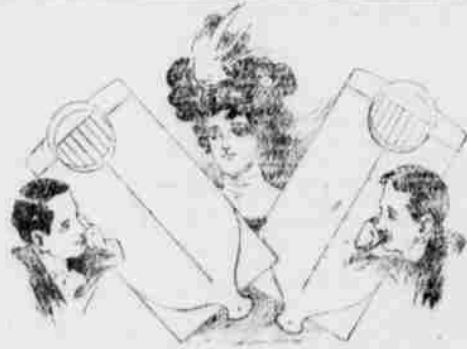
