AN ABLE SERMON

REV. KING ANSWERS RABBI WISE'S LECTURE.

Takes Up the Question of Christ's Divinity From the Catholic Bide-Spoke Highly of the Lecture by Dr. Wise.

The Daptist efforch was packed with people Sunday evening to hear Rev. R. W. King speak in answer to some of the points brought out by Di-Stephen S. Wise, the noted Rabbi, of Portland, who delivered a lecture on "israel's Giffs to the World." in the same church fast week

same church last week. Rev. King began his remarks by paying Dr. Wise the very highest compliments as a gentleman and able speaker. He did nor attempt to an-tagonize Dr. Wise but only bointed out to his hearcris that there were two sides to the question upon which Dr. Wise spoke. Dr. Wise said things which have caused considerable com-ment among the people and It was ment among the people and it was these questions which Rev. King attempted to answer.

One of the points he touched upon last night was the contention of the noted rabbi that the Jews were not responsible for the crucifixion of Christ. Rev. King agreed with him in some respect as he stated that if was the sin of the human heart that was responsible for the crucifixion. Also that the Roman government was in a measure responsible as it was through the weakness of Pontins Pi late, the head of the Roman government, that Christ was slaid, as he could have released him, but the crucifixion should rest on the shoulders of the Jews.

Rev. King quoted scripture to prove this contention. He noted as the highest authority on Jewish history, where he said that it was upon "dewhere he said that it was upon "de-mand of my people before Pontius Plinte, that Christ was delivered into the hands of the principal people of my nation to be crucified." Dr. Wise, in his lecture, said that Christ was one of the greatest, best and wisest men of his day, but he held that there was nothing divine about him. Rev. King said that upon this statement above was proven the this statement alone was proven the divinity of Christ. It was contended by the rabbi that the statements of the Bible where Christ said that be was the son of God had been inserted the writers, thit Roy, King said that had this been the case the fact would have been discovered long ago as the world was full of noted writers who held opposite views to those of the Bible writers at the time it was being written.

"Roussone, the noted infidel, and many of his followers, said if the gospels were only written by the author ity of men and not by divine inspiration then these men were greater than the hero of whom they wrote " said Dr. King. Many other very interesting points

were brought out by Rev. King, but the above were the principal ones and space forbids further comment. The speech was a materpiece and those present were highly pleased.


