## RESISTED ARREST

NEGRO TRAMP SHOOTS AT MARSHAL OF FREEWATER.

No One Hurt—Much Excitement Aroused—Negro Escaped—Supposed to Have Been Wounded.

FreeWater, Dec. 17.—A pistol duel between Arthur Dorsey, a negro and City Marshal Lombard caused considerable excitement on the streets here Tuesday evening.

Dorsey, who has been hanging around FreeWater for several days without any visible means of support, was thought to be carrying concealed weapons. Tuesday evening about 5:30 the marshal undertook to arrest the negro, who resisted. The marshal got hold of Dorsey but the latter jerked loose, stepped back and drew a revolver, telling the officer to keep his hands off.

Not being inclined to be bluffed at the display of a gun in the hands of the negro, Lombard drew his revolver but the negro, instead of opening fire at first, started to run. The marshal followed and the negro opened fire back at the approaching officer. The officer returned the fire and for a few minutes the air was full of flying bullets. The streets were soon crowded with people attracted by the shooting, and several took a hand with the marshal in the chase.

After running the negro several blocks he disappeared in the darkness and no trace of him has since been found, but it is believed that he was hit by a bullet from the revolver of the marshal. When one shot was fired he uttered a cry as if shot, but did not halt.

Nobody knows where the negro came from or where he went to, but it is supposed that he caught an outgoing train and left town directly after the fierce pistol duel.

Nothing has happened in FreeWater for several months to create such a furry of excitement as did the negro and his ugly looking revolver.

### GENERAL NEWS.

The Japanese government is using X-ray machines to detect dishonest mint workmen who swallow money.

A New York engineer is suffering from hydrophobia caused by a scratch on the wrist by a pet mink cat. He will probably die.

It is reported that a band of Hinko Indians has taken the war path in the region of the Little Salmon River, in the Yukon basin, of Alaska.

The roundhouse of the Pennsylvania road at West Philadelphia, collapsed Monday afternoon, burying 50 men and 20 locomotives in the ruins. Nobody was killed.

Miss May Goelet, an American girl, worth \$20,000,000, is becoming noted for the number of hand-me-down dukes, barons and earls she has refused. She has little time for foreigners.

Senator Foraker has introduced a bill to provide a government for the Island of Guam. It rests in the president to select a person or persons who shall exercise all military, civil and judicial power necessary for the inhabitants of the island.

Three men made a daring attempt to hold up the cashier and rob the First National Bank of Alford, Texas, Monday. One of the robbers, Frank Martin, was killed, another, Martin McFall, is desperately wounded, and the third, Claude Golden, is in custody.

### PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The Linn county jail is filled with prisoners, for the first time in years.

Warrants have been issued to Sheriff Story, of Multnomah county, for 12 militiamen who have failed to attend drill.

Harry Thomas was found guilty, in Portland, of stealing a diamond pin from the person of S. F. Hanawalt, in a street car.

A. M. Humphreys has been convicted of stealing grain from his warehouse, and received a sentence of two years in the penitentiary.

Paul Weissenger, one of the committeemen of the Lewis and Clark fair, received the first certificate of stock issued by Secretary Reed, Tuesday.

A fight between young Gibbs, of Cleveland, and Kid Williams, of Denver, at Seattle Tuesday night, resulted in a general riot, in which the police interfered.

A large log drive is being arranged for Rogue River. R. D. Hume, of the lower river, has purchased over 100,000 feet above his mills, and the rafts are being built.
