COUNCIL MEETING

QUARANTINE REGULATIONS MUST BE ENFORCED.

Application for Franchise Received for New Telephone System—Will Have County and Rural Telephone Connections.

City council last night referred the application of J. H. Lowrey for franchise for another telephone system to street committee. Instructed city officials to be more stringent in enforcing the quarantine regulations. Instructed Mayor Halley to draw up plans for the forming of a cemetery association. Passed on returns of fire companies' elections. Granted more time to committee on grading streets north of the river. Referred petition for sidewalks to street committee.

Although the session of the city council last night was short, a large volume of business was transacted. The most important was the passing upon the petition of J. H. Lowrey for a franchise for a new telephone system. A company has been formed with Mr. Lowrey at the head, which proposes to erect and maintain an up-to-date telephone system in the city and throughout the county. The franchise is asked for the city first, as it is deemed an easy matter to get the franchise for the rest of the county and other little towns in the county after the franchise is granted by the city.

Rural Telephone System.
It is the intention of the company back of the proposition to run a rural telephone system over the county as well as in the city, similar to those in many places in the thickly settled countries of the East and Middle States. Every farmer who wants to keep in touch with his fellowman and with the world at large may have his house wired and a telephone in his own home at a very small figure. Mr. Lowrey declared that all the details and preliminaries had already been completed and as soon as the franchise was granted by the city council work would be commenced. It will mean a better system for the city and will prove a great advancement for the rural districts and smaller towns of the county.

Contagious Diseases.
The matter of enforcing the quarantine regulations to prevent the spread of contagious diseases was discussed at length and the city marshal and health officers were instructed to see that better observance of the ordinance on the matter be kept. At the present time there are many cases of contagious diseases. One or two cases of smallpox, several cases of scarlet fever, some measles, whooping cough and other contagious diseases are reported to the city officials. Heretofore the enforcement of the ordinance regarding quarantine has been somewhat disregarded. Heads of families with such diseases in the family have neglected to report the matter to the health officer and the spread of contagion has been materially helped along by such neglect. In 1888 a city ordinance was passed which lays every practicing physician and every head of a family liable to a fine of not less than \$25 or more than \$100 and imprisonment not more than 20 days who does not report at once any case of contagion known to him or his family. When such report is made to the health officer then it is the duty of the city marshal to establish a strict quarantine and put up a flag. If the quarantine law is broken by any one in the family the same punishment may be meted out to him that is due the official failing to report. No person who is effected or who has been exposed to any contagious disease will be allowed to mingle with others and none shall leave a house which has been quarantined without a written consent from the city physician or the attending physician. The mayor, Councilmen Hartman, Clopton and Switzer are the health committee, and they were instructed to see that these regulations were carried out. The police were instructed to make any arrest where the ordinance was not strictly adhered to.

Cemetery Association.
The subject of forming a cemetery association was again brought up. Mayor Halley was instructed to draw up plans necessary for the forming of the association to take the control of the Oney cemetery entirely out of the hands of the city. This matter was brought up several months ago, but nothing came of it further than talk, but now it is thought that such an organization may be formed without trouble. At present the Oney cemetery is marked with no care. There are no shade trees, flowers or other things in the cemetery to make it look like a home of the dead other than the bleak shafts standing at the heads of the graves. The cemetery has no water system and without water cannot be beautified. This is a question which has agitated the council for many years and will be turned over to this association if formed.

General Business.
The returns of the firemen's election were passed upon and reported favorably. The election of Withee chief, Randall first and Brown second vice-presidents, were affirmed. More time was granted to the committee appointed to report on grading of the streets north of the river. The petition of Todd and others for a sidewalk on the south side of Court street, was referred to the street committee. The petition of S. A. Hampton for a crossing over the W. & C. R. track in front of his home on Webb street, was referred to the street committee.
