# HORSES IN DEMAND

EXPORTATION OF HORSES HAS GROWN STRONG.

South Africa Has Ordered the Largest Amount of American Horses-Philippine Demand Not Great-Pony Trade Reviving.

That American horseflesh is rapidly growing in favor in foreign mar-kets statistics proved. Within the last six years Great Britain alone spent \$35,000,000 in the United States spent \$35,000,000 in the United States in the purchase of horses, indepen-dent of the many millions she spent for mules. Last year not less than 75,000 horses were shipped from this country to England.

Exportation Light Before 1895.

Until 1895 the exportation of horses price? from the United States was not an important item, but since then it has grown into something enormous and Great Britain is only one of the many foreign countries whose recognition of the superiority of American horse-flesh is attested by large purchases. Boer War Demand.

During the last six years American shipments of horses to other countries have been as follows: South Africa, 37,465; Canada, 8438; Cuba, 4,436; British Columbia, 1578; China, 2-317; Philippines, 1573; Japan, 1535; British West Indies, 190, and others scattering. scattering.

Germany, France, Russia and Aus tria are likewise included among the number of foreign purchasers of American horseflesh, but they have just begun to make purchases and have only invested up to the present time in trotting stock.

The Boer war stimulated the Amer ican horse market to a great degree of activity. The Spanish war caused a flurry and the supply today is shorter in the West than it has been since 1875.

Farmers quit raising horses when the hard times of 1894 came on. In 1893, over 10,000 head of horses were driven out of Oregon, to Colorado, Oklahoma and Indian territory, in search of cheap feed and more range.

Today the large bands are dwindled down to one-fourth their original size The price is up and the supply is down. Good brood mares in Oregon are worth almost as much today as they were before railroads were built into Oregon

### The Pony Craze,

The pony has come back into popularity. The demand for small saddle stock, not necessarily Shetlands, but small, smooth, gentle ponies, is brisk in the cities of the East and middle states, and pony raising has bright prospects ahead of it. In the West where feed is cheap and range is plentiful, this industry can be successfully carried on.

Concerning Two Deceased Porkers.

The other day two dressed hogs, cold and stiff in the frozen embrace of death were found in a back near Henry Pinkerton's place between Weston and Athena. "Jinks" Taylor notified Constable Jesse Lieualien, of Weston concerning this suspicious circumstance, and also that he had removed a nut from the hack, so that the supposed thieves could not make a "get away." Our vigilant consta-ble became greatly interested, and tried to induce George Reynolds to go out with him and help guard the hogs at night. Failing in this, he and Constable Dykes made careful search for clews, only to discover that the hogs were not stolen property, but had been put in an old hack by Mr. Pin-kerton until the ground would thaw out sufficiently to permit decent bur-ial. They were found to be diseased when slaughtered. Jesse says the joke is on "Jinks" but other opinions differ.-Weston Leader.
