GOOD CITIZENSHIP

PRESIDENT OF WHITMAN GIVES SECOND LECTURE.

Dr. Penrose Addresses the People of Pendleton at the Baptist Church.

Dr. Penrose, president of the Whitman college, delivered the second of the series of lectures at the Baptist church last night under the auspices of the Men's Society. His theme was "Good Citizenship."

Only a small audience greeted the doctor but his address was one that should have been heard by every citizen of Pendleton.

Dr. Penrose handled the subject from an educational standpoint and first spoke of the man who becomes interested in public affairs as being the first step toward the good citizen. He said that the man who took the interests of his neighbors and the community at heart, who went to the polls in rainy weather as well as good, who attended the primaries and cast his vote on the side calculated to rebuild mankind and for the betterment of his fellow man was the good citizen. The man who accepted office at the hands of the people for the good that he could do his fellow man and not for selfish reasons was another type of a good citizen.

The speaker also compared the man who was always whooping it up for any public movement in improving the town or country and who always put his shoulder to the wheel and helped every scheme calculated toward civic pride with the man who was kicking against any move for the betterment of a town or city, and said that the man who advanced and advocated improvements was the good citizen while the other was a detriment to a community.

The speaker kept his small audience interested for almost an hour and those who heard it are regretting that more were not present. It was a masterful appeal for better citizenship and would tend to elevate the ideas of any man or woman and cause them to hesitate before opposing any move toward better government and better citizenship.

TRAINING FOR SALEM.

Art Hicks Finds a Sentence and a Fine Along With His Fighting.

Art Hicks is again in the toils of the law. Hicks was arrested at an early hour this morning in a drunken row in one of the saloons. He was locked up but the charge of disorderly conduct was not put against him and he is now awaiting the completion of his sentence for a more serious charge.

The officers have had a warrant for Hicks for several days for assault on a Chinaman and cutting off of the Celestial queue. He kept himself out of sight of the officers but when picked up this morning was turned over to District Attorney Halley on the assault charge. Halley took Hicks before Judge Fitz Gerald this morning and the prisoner pleaded guilty and was given a sentence of 12 days in the county jail or pay a fine of \$25. In default he went to jail.

Hicks is noted for his tendency to get into trouble. He was in police court frequently for fighting up to a little over a year ago when he was sentenced to one year in the penitentiary for destroying public property. He has only been out a few weeks and apparently was treated so well there that he is trying to break back into the state prison.

IN POLICE COURT.

Connelly Appears and Pays \$15—Ragan Wanted for the Same Amount.

Justice is still falling on the heads of those responsible for the drunken row in the basement of the Hendricks building Thursday. It was noted yesterday that warrants were out for the arrest of William Connelly and Al Ragan for their part in the affair. Connelly appeared this morning and pleaded guilty to the charge of being disorderly and was fined \$15. Ragan has not appeared, but a warrant is still out for him. When he is arrested or presents himself before Judge Fitz Gerald he will be asked to donate the same amount.

B. W. Miller was also fined this morning for allowing minors in his saloon. He pleaded guilty and was fined \$10.

Peter Hansen went to jail for five days in default of \$10 fine for being drunk and disorderly.
