SHEEP DISEASED

CASES REPORTED TO AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE.

New Ailment in Oregon—May be Well for Eastern Oregon Sheepmen to Watch Their Flocks Closely.

Information reached the Agricultural college Wednesday afternoon of the presence in Alsea of the sheep disease with which the flocks of A. W. Hawley were affected last year, says the Corvallis Times. The ailment affects the lips and nostrils which become badly swollen and render eating and breathing difficult. It first appears in the nature of pimples which multiply in number until the whole surface of the affected parts becomes involved.

Ultimately the pimples resolve themselves into pustules, and become confluent forming a hard outer scab under which is pus. The whole takes on a highly inflamed condition, and seems to be very annoying to the affected animals. The latter rub their noses on the ground which in turn increases the violence of the symptoms.

The disease is infectious, but not necessarily fatal. Of 600 or 700 affected in A. W. Hawley's band last year, less than a half dozen died. Equal parts of ichthyol and vaseline applied to the parts is a speedy and effective remedy. There are also several other remedies, some of which are less expensive than ichthyol and vaseline treatment.

The same disease was widely prevalent in Lincoln county last year. Its origin is unknown, and the disease is comparatively new in this country. It is often prevalent in European herds.

CHANGE OF TIME

O. R. & N. TIME CARD EFFECTIVE TOMORROW.

Company Considers the Conveniences of Umatilla County People—Branch Train From Walla Walla Now Arrives at 1 P. M.

A new time card on the O. R. & N. takes effect tomorrow, and copies have been received at the local office. The principle changes which will effect Pendleton are as follows:

No. 2, the Chicago Special, east-bound, will arrive at 5:40 and depart at 5:30 p. m. No. 5, the westbound mail and express will arrive at 1:45 and depart at 1:50 a. m. No. 6, the eastbound mail and express will arrive at 4:45 and depart at 4:50 a. m.; the west-bound Portland special will arrive at 8 a. m. and depart at 8:10, as at present.

The Spokane passenger train, No. 8, will depart at 8:15 a. m., as at present, and the passenger train from Spokane will arrive at 5:45 p. m.

Most Important Change.

One of the most important changes in the entire card, and one which was made for the especial benefit of Pendleton and the neighboring towns of Umatilla county, effects the mixed branch which now arrives here at 2:40 p. m.

People from the country desiring to trade and transact business in this city have been unable to spend as much time in Pendleton as they desired, on account of the late hour at which this train arrived, and in answer to the earnest request of patrons of this train, warmly seconded by Agent Wamsley the company consented to change the hour of its arrival to 1 p. m., giving the country people nearly two hours more in this city, before the departure of No. 42 at 6 p. m.

No. 41, the mixed train, now arrives at 1 p. m. and No. 42, departs at 6 p. m.

GOES TO SALEM

MRS. CHRIS LEMPKÉ ADJUDGED INSANE.

Her Condition Brought on by the Suicide of Her Husband Last Wednesday.

Sheriff T. D. Taylor left this morning for Salem with Mrs. Chris Lempe who was adjudged insane Saturday evening.

Mrs. Lempe's is one of the saddest cases in the history of Umatilla. While she is not considered incurable she is now in a critical condition. Her condition was brought on by the suicide of her husband last Wednesday. Since his death Mrs. Lempe has continuously been brooding over the sad and untimely taking off of her husband.

When she was brought to town Saturday evening, Dr. McPaul, the examining physician, thought that by a few days' rest and a little sleep she would be alright again. She was kept here Saturday night and Sunday and opiates were given her to produce sleep, but instead of being improved by the rest she became worse and it was deemed best to send her to Salem for a few weeks where she could have the very best of care and be under skilled physicians.

She is not violent and makes no disturbance, but is just stupid and broken down. The worry of her husband's death has overtaxed her nerves and she is a total wreck physically. It is thought that with a few weeks of quiet away from the scene of her husband's suicide that she will again be brought back to herself and be rational.

Water at 150 Feet.

S. E. Walker, who erected a residence on the hill, near Olney cemetery, last fall, has just completed a well 150 feet deep. He says that he now has about 50 feet of water, but thinks he will go still deeper. He will put up a windmill to pump the water.
