OREGON MAN FREE

GEORGE MOREY SERVING LIFE SENTENCE, PARDONED.

Tragedy Which Excited Wide Attention Recalled After Serving Ten Years—Strong Influence Results in a Release.

Salem, Ore., Dec. 24.—Governor Geer yesterday granted a full pardon to George Morey, who was serving a life sentence at the penitentiary, upon conviction of murder in the first degree for the killing of one, Gus Barry, in Portland, on January 14, 1893. This petition has been pending for several years, having been presented during the second term of Governor Penneyer.

A brief outline of the history of the case follows: Gus Barry and his wife resided on Clay street, in Portland, and with them resided one, Miss Annie Wright, a sister of Mrs. Barry and Miss Wright requested George Morey to come and stay at the house for a few nights for the reason that Barry was on a spree and they feared that he would do them bodily harm.

Morey accepted the invitation and stayed with them as requested, and, on the night of January 14, about 1:30 o'clock in the morning, Morey came home and, upon being let into the house, asked if Barry had come yet.

Miss Wright, who admitted Morey, stated that she did not know, and Morey said he would go and find out. He went to the door of the room in which Barry and his wife slept and looked in and an altercation immediately ensued between Morey and Barry in which Morey shot Barry, from the effects of which Barry afterwards died.

THE TOOTHPICK HABIT.

Has Become so Prevalent and Marked as to Give Clew to Character.

We have the drink habit, the card playing habit, the tobacco habit—in fact, habits innumerable, but there is one habit of which little has been said, although it is present among us. It is the toothpick habit, and it is as firmly rooted in those who have it as any of the more objectionable ones.
