

CHURCH EXERCISES

CHILDREN OF PENDLETON GIVEN CHRISTMAS PRESENTS.

All the Churches Celebrated the Hol-
iday in a most Appropriate Manner
—Many Valuable and Useful Gifts
Distributed.

The churches of the city celebrated
Christmas in a most appropriate man-
ner. Beside the public exercises, a
great amount of charitable work has
been done among the poor families.
Many valuable gifts of useful and
necessary articles have been given by
the members of the various churches
and societies and this Christmas tide
has witnessed numberless unheralded
deeds of charity, kindness and re-
lief in this community.

Baptist Church.

The first part of the entertainment
at the Baptist church was a program
rendered by the Sunday school. This
was short and following it came a
genuine surprise for all. Instead of
having a regular Christmas tree on
the platform was erected an old-fash-
ioned Holland wind mill. The miller
stepped out of his little hut and was
approached by a farmer with a sack
of corn to be ground. The miller
looked around, and seeing that there
was no wind to turn his mill, declared
he could not grind the corn for the
farmer. The farmer said he must
have the mill, as his family was in
distress and he could not wait. Then
the miller said he would give him
meal from his own trusty barrel to
last him until the wind came up. The
barrel was rolled out onto the stage
and broken open with a sledge. When
the barrel was opened two little
brownies stepped out, to the surprise
of the audience. The miller looked
surprised and the brownies asked
what was the matter. The trouble was
explained and they said they would
see if they could not remedy the mat-
ter. They walked down in front of
the wind mill and began to blow to-
wards the fans. The mill began to
turn and the miller poured in the
grain the farmer had brought. In-
stead of grinding out flour, little sacks
of candy began to pour out of the
mill. These were passed out to the
children in the audience. It was a
unique and delightful entertainment.

Congregational Church.

The Congregational church was filled
with people Wednesday evening to
witness the exercises of the Sunday
school children. The program, al-
though short, was very appropriate
and highly enjoyed by all. Follow-
ing the program the presents were
taken from the tree and each child
received a sack of candy and nuts.




