## SHEEP MEN MEET

### ADOPT WARM RESOLUTIONS AND DISCUSS RESERVE.

In Favor of Increasing Salary of Baker County Stock Inspector—Two Mile Range Limit Causes Lively Debate.

Baker City, Oregon, Dec. 30.—A meeting of the Eastern Oregon Sheep Association was held in this city Sunday. A number of the delegates from a distance could not be present owing to delayed trains and bad roads. The meeting was an interesting and important one and considerable business was transacted. Much of the work was of a secret character but a portion of the proceedings was given out for publication.

Mr. Byron Gale acted as temporary chairman and Mr. W. G. Ayre as secretary. After calling the meeting to order the first business of importance was the electing of officers for the ensuing year. By unanimous vote, the following were chosen: President, Sam Kidder; secretary and treasurer, W. G. Ayre; executive committee, Sam Kidder, W. G. Ayre, F. Bennett, C. Gale and W. H. Colton. After some discussion a resolution was passed that this organization being desirous of securing the National Livestock Association annual meeting for 1904 in Oregon, hereby pledges itself to use every honest endeavor with that end in view.

A resolution was also passed: "This association views with pleasure the coming of the State Woolgrowers' Association in September, 1903, and pledges its members to assist in making the same a success." This resolution was also adopted: "In view of the increase in the size of Baker county by the addition of the Panhandle district, be it resolved that a petition be made to the proper authorities to increase the salary of

the stock inspector because of the enlargement of his duties.

A motion was adopted that the Baker county local organization become a part of the state association. The Blue Mountain forest reserve question was discussed at full length, resulting in the adoption of a resolution sustaining the reserve on general principles, recognizing its necessity and recommending certain changes in its boundary lines.

The two-mile limit law occasioned a hot and energetic discussion on the part of all the members of the association and measures were adopted to secure equal rights on the ranges for all stockmen.

After the transaction of routine business the meeting adjourned.

**SCHOOL OF MINES.**  
Oregon May Get an Appropriation for Such Purposes.  
The Oregon delegation at Washington is in favor of an appropriation for the establishment of a school of mines and mining in Oregon. For this reason the members of the delegation will support the Grosvenor bill which provides that a certain percentage of the amount derived from the sale of public lands in the West be set aside for the establishment of schools of mines and mining.

Some time ago the Portland Chamber of Commerce took favorable action on this matter and called the attention of the Oregon delegation to that effect. This morning letters were received from Senators Simon and Mitchell and Representative Tongue that they will do everything possible to secure the necessary legislation.

**Throngs of Teachers.**  
Baton Rouge, La., Dec. 29.—From every direction and on every train throngs of teachers are arriving to attend the 11th annual convention of the Louisiana Public School Teachers' Association, which begins this evening at the state university. Present indications are that all previous attendance records will be broken. The teachers will be welcomed by Governor Heard, J. V. Calhoun, state superintendent of public instruction, and President Boyd, of the university. These addresses of welcome and the responses, with the annual address of the association president, Miss Lula Soape, of Shreveport, will occupy the opening session. The real business of the convention will be taken up tomorrow morning and will be continued through Wednesday.
