COUNCIL MEETING

**PROPOSE TO KEEP INDIANS
ON RESERVATION AT NIGHT.**
Instruct Sewer Committee to Employ
Engineers to Make a Complete Sur-
vey of City.

City Council last night—
Instructed the marshal to see
that Indians stay off the
streets between sundown and
sunup.
Instructed sewer committee to
employ engineers to make es-
timate of the cost of proposed
sewer and also to give an es-
timate for complete system
for all time to come.
Allowed six liquor licenses.
Allowed salary list.
Ordered sidewalk on East Court
street.

The city council met in regular ses-
sion last night and transacted the cur-
rent business of the city, besides
winding up the business of the past
year.

Indians Must Go Home.
The city marshal was instructed
to see that the Indians from the re-
servation did not remain in town over
night.

For the past several months the In-
dians have been coming to town, get-
ting drunk and making themselves a
nuisance and having to be locked up.
This is becoming tiresome and the
present step by the council is intend-
ed to eradicate it as much as possi-
ble. The Indians give the police more
trouble than the whites. They man-
age to get hold of whiskey and it
takes but little to make them trouble-
some. When drunk they are boister-
ous and the only thing to do with
them is to throw them in jail. This
costs the city many dollars in the
course of a month and little revenue
is brought in by them as they sel-
dom have any money with which to
pay fines. When arrested they have
to be committed to jail where they
are fed at the city's expense.
Being treated in this way does not
deter them from repeating the per-
formance as soon as released. It is
now proposed to make them leave
town when evening comes.

This custom has been practiced un-
til recently and few Indians were
ever in town after sundown. Of late
no effort has been made to keep them
out.

Will Survey for Sewer.
The sewer committee was instructed
to employ competent engineers to
survey the city for the proposed sewer
system. It was the wish of the
council that this be done as economi-
cally as possible, but it was also stat-
ed that no pains or money should be
spared to secure competent men to
do the work. Not only is it the in-
tention of the city to have the portion
of the city surveyed where the pro-
posed sewer is to be laid during the
coming summer, but the entire town
will be surveyed. Estimates on the
cost of sewerage for the town for present
needs, as well as for all future needs,
will be secured, and then the esti-
mates for the proposed sewerage at
the present time will be taken from
this.

Renewed Liquor Licenses.
Six liquor licenses were renewed.
They were for Damain Bros., George
Darveau, M. F. Kelly, Van Dran
Bros., Baker & Ogg, Murphy & Lan-
gever.

Salary Lists Allowed.
The salary lists for the month of
December were allowed. The salary
of W. G. Cole, city physician and
health officer, amounting to \$250, was
allowed.

Ordered Sidewalk.
In recognition of the petition of the
residents of East Court street, side-
walk was ordered laid from the Sis-
ter's school east for seven blocks.

City Attorney Wanted.
The council instructed City Record-
er Fitz Gerald to write an invitation
to City Attorney Carter, requesting
his presence at the next meeting.
Some perplexing questions have been
before the city, and the opinion of the
attorney is needed.

Rumor Unfounded.
It was currently talked on the
street last evening just before coun-
cil meeting, that there was going to
be a change in police circles. The
talk was that Policeman Fee would
be asked for his resignation by Chief
Blakley. It was also rumored that
Fee intended handing in his resig-
nation to the council. There was little
foundation for the rumor. Chief Blak-
ley said this morning that he had
never thought of asking Policeman
Fee for his resignation. He said that
Fee was doing his work satisfactorily
and there was no cause for the talk.

Sixty-two Won the Watch.
No. 62 won the fine \$100 ladies'
gold watch given away by Louis Hun-
ziker to his holiday customers. With
every \$1 purchase he gave a ticket,
entitling the holder to a chance on
the watch. The drawing came off
this morning, but the holder of the
lucky number has not appeared to
claim the watch.

Prison.

of Spokane county. They are: Wil-
liam Thomas Clark, uttering forged
instruction, one year and six months;
Burt Cofer, horse stealing, one year
and six months; Joseph Cook, at-
tempt to rob, two years; Gust Ander-
son, manslaughter, seven years; Har-
ry C. Corbett, attempt to commit rob-
bery, two years; Carmine Pettinato,
criminal assault, three years.—Walla
