## FORTY NEW ENGINES

### GREAT WESTERN ADDS TO ITS EQUIPMENT.

Twenty Passenger Locomotives and Twenty for Freight Service—Intended for Service on All Divisions. Dunkirk, N. Y., Jan. 31.—The Chicago Great Western Railway has ordered from the Brooks Locomotive Works of this city, 20 new passenger locomotives and as many freight. The contracts call for delivery in January and February, and when the new engines are added to the equipment of the company there will be a total of 312 locomotives, compared with 211 a year ago. The new engines are designed for service on all divisions of the system. With that addition the company will be in fair condition so far as motive power is concerned until the opening of the year and the consequent increase of business renders more power necessary. The new passenger engines are of the Lake Shore type, piston valve and wide firebox. That type of engine has ten wheels—a pony truck, three drivers on a side and a trailer. The drivers are 68-inch, the truck wheels 36, and the trailers 42. The weight on the drivers is 110,000 and the whole engine weighs 160,000 pounds. The freight engines are of the prairie type, Brooks tandem, and are similar in all respects to the 20 engines received by the Chicago Great Western last summer. The new engines will have the Pyle national electric headlights. The engines will cost from \$15,000 to \$18,000 each.

### PAUL MOHR QUITS OREGON.

Pioneer Railroad Builder Will Devote Rest of His Life to Orange Growing. Portland, Jan. 1.—Paul F. Mohr has forsaken the Pacific Northwest. He has cleaned up his extensive transportation enterprises in Washington and Oregon, sold out everything and gone to California to live. He has purchased an orange grove in the Los Angeles district and will make his future home there. At least his friends in this city say this is what he has done and will do. He spent a few days very quietly in Portland before Christmas, but is said to have returned to California. There is no doubt in the minds of those familiar with the course of the Paul Mohr transportation scheme that he has disposed of his entire interest in the portage railroad at the dallas of the Columbia. Mr. Mohr has said repeatedly that he had no negotiations with the Northern Pacific Railroad company pertaining to transfer that property, but there is a pretty definite understanding in railroad circles that the Northern Pacific rail-

road now has control of that property, directly or indirectly. It is said that Mr. Mohr got between \$75,000 and \$100,000 out of the clean-up, besides which it took something like \$50,000 to settle the claims against the property on the basis of 20 per cent. About \$150,000 was required to put the property in its present position after the failure of the Central Navigation & Construction Company. About 11 miles of the portage road is practically completed. This is all there is to show for an expenditure of more than \$600,000. Mr. Mohr himself put into the enterprise much more than he got out of it. Mr. Mohr had a quite active career in the Pacific Northwest, but it is said he has no business interests left in this quarter and that he will henceforth devote himself to growing oranges in the Sunny South. He went from Oregon to Honolulu last August and remained in the islands a few months. After the examination of the Hawaiians he concluded it would be better to establish himself in California.

### "Wipe Out the Trusts."

New York, Jan. 2.—The beginning of the new year witnesses more active steps in the warfare against the tobacco trust than any heretofore taken. Visits to the stores of the independent cigar dealers disclose the fact that the familiar goods of the various firms allied with the trust have been removed from show cases and windows and signs and cards advertising the trust wares are also conspicuous by their absence. It has taken the Retail Cigar and Tobacco Dealers' Association several months to perfect their organization, but now with a membership of nearly 1000 dealers, the association seems to be in a fair way to make the combine feel its claws. At a meeting of the association tonight delegates will be associated to attend the convention of the National Retail Cigar and Tobacco Dealers' Association, to be held in Chicago two weeks hence. At this convention a working plan will be formulated to bring the independent dealers in New York, Chicago, Indianapolis, Detroit and other cities where organizations have been formed, into active co-operation for the fight against the trust.

### Senator Clark's New City.

Salt Lake City, Utah, Jan. 1.—Word is expected daily of the consummation of the negotiations pending for some time past between United States Senators Clark of Montana, and Stewart of Nevada, for the purchase of the Las Vegas ranch in Southern Nevada by Clark. The object of the purchase is said to be the building of a new city nearly midway between Los Angeles and Salt Lake on the San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake railroad. Las Vegas ranch is in Lincoln county, Nevada, and the property is described as exceptionally fertile. Included are 1800 acres of tillable land, with 500 inches of water. The purchase price will be about \$55,000. It is intended to establish in the new city, roundhouses, shops and other adjuncts necessary for a railroad town such as that proposed. The ranch proper is said to be a garden spot, productive of semi-tropical, and citrus products of all kinds.

### \$12,000,000 Electric Plant.

Mexico City, Jan. 2.—Sir Westman Parsons & Son, the English contractors who have large interests in Mexico, have obtained a concession from the Mexican government for the establishment of an extensive system of electrical energy. They announce that they have the necessary plans completed for expending \$12,000,000 gold in constructing an electric generating plant in the mountains of the state of Puebla, where there is an abundance of water power. It is proposed to establish transmission lines from the generating plant to this city and to have available 80,000 horse power of electrical energy for electric lights and power for manufacturing concerns here.
