JAPAN MILLERS BUYING

IN PORTLAND MARKETS.

Amount on Hand Will Be Very Light After This Month and the Local Mills Will Need the Remainder-Unusually Wide Territory Covered in Distribution.

Portland, Jan. 7.-Exporters eneaged in the distribution of breadstuffs are this season covering a ider territory than ever before.

Throughout the season they have seen shipping steadily to Europe, Africa, Chira, Japan, Siberia, Australia. New Zealand and South America, and a few booked for shipment to Tahiti, in the South Seas. The demands of the Orient have up to the present time been confined to flour but now Japan is in the Portland market as a purchaser of wheat, and the steamship Indrapura, sailing next week, will take out a consignment of about 25,000 bushels of Walla Walla wheat for a Kobe miller. January shipments of wheat and

flour to all ports will be much heavier than was thought possible a month This is due to the recent charter of several spot or nearby ships. Unless, however, there is something wrong with the estimates for the 190 crop, the wheat business after February I will be of much smaller proportions than usual, although flour trade may be depended on to hold up to last year's proportions. and may exceed them for the remainder of the season.

January shipments (flour included) from Portland will approximate 1. 900,000 bushels, and from Puget Sound 1,700,000 bushels. Of this amount, 1,500,000 bushels will go out as wheat from Portland, and the re mainder as flour.

From Tacoma and Seattle, the shipments will be approximately 900,000 bushels of wheat and 170,000 barrels These shipments will bring the January total from Oregon and Washington up to about 3,615,000 The shipments for the first six months of the season from Port-land and Puget Sound were (flour included) 17,322,619 bushels.

The January shipments will swell the total for the season to February to 20,937,000 bushels. The crop of the three states is pretty generally estimated at well under 40,000,000 bushels, some authorities placing it as low as 35,000,000 bushels. Admitting that it will reach 38,000,000 bushels, it is already apparent that there will be but a small amount available for export as wheat after February 1.

Though it is not very generally practiced, it is legal to copyright the book plate design. At least two plates are so protected in this country. This would seem to leave a door open for those who wish to secure for themselves a personal distinguishing mark, a quasiheraldry, for the drawing may be in heraldic form as well as in any other .-Century.
