Wheat Market.
 Portland, Jan. 8.—The local market is rather quiet and sales of wheat are limited, the first half of the cereal year has passed and we find that the trade has fully kept up with the preceding, as the tables at the head of this column show. From authentic sources we find that there is fully 4,500,000 to 5,000,000 bushels of wheat yet to be sold. Exporters and millers have the balance, the next three months will probably wind up the wheat trade for the season. Sellers have not as yet come to the conclusion to part with any of their holdings, and are not in the market at present prices. Exporters are paying more for wheat than the market warrants, but this inducement does not make the seller anxious to let go; we doubt if there will be much wheat sold before the first of March. In the meantime exporters are busy loading vessels and are not troubled for wheat, as the same was provided for before the vessels were chartered. There has been some calls made for wheat to Africa and Australia during the week and a number of ships were chartered for these destinations. Buyers and sellers are so far apart that a material rise in prices on the part of buyers will have to be made. We quote club wheat, 72c; blue stem, 80c, and valley, 76@77c. Some houses here quote 1c to 2c less per bushel.

San Francisco, Jan. 8.—Spot market remains unchanged at quotations formerly quoted. Shippers manifest no anxiety to purchase, and are paying but little attention to offerings, as prices are entirely too high to do business on a profitable basis; holders do not seem anxious to reduce their ideas as to values, hence nothing is doing. In the speculative markets very little is doing, and the markets are in an unsettled condition; No. 1 shipping prices range from \$1.37 1/2 to \$1.40; milling, \$1.42 1/2 to \$1.47 1/2 per cental.

Wool Markets.
 Boston, Jan. 8.—The wool market held rather quiet over the holidays as a whole, but some houses report a good week's business. Some buyers think the market is as high as it is likely to go, but there is certainly nothing that would indicate that the price limit has been reached yet. There was a tremendous advance, especially in pulled and combing wools. These wools show an advance of 2@4c per pound, and are now fully on a parity with the rest of the market. The request for territory wools continues excellent. Prices are fully maintained. Fine staple territory, 55@60c; strictly fine, 60@55c; fine and fine medium, 50@53c; medium, 45@

 Milwaukee, Wis., Jan. 8.—This was another interesting and profitable day for the delegates in attendance on the annual convention of the Wisconsin Cheesemakers' Association. During the forenoon the convention listened to papers as follows: "Breeding and Rearing a Profitable Dairy Worker," Mrs. Adda F. Howie; "Women as Cheese Factory Managers and Cheesemakers," Miss M. A. Raeder; "Economy in Marketing Cheese," H. K. Dowling. An important feature of the afternoon session was an address upon "The Desirable Qualities in Canadian Cheese," by Prof. H. H. Dean, of the Ontario Agricultural college at Guelph.
